Allen Gives Resignation

Desires Full-Time Coaching Position

(Exclusive to the Quaker Campus)

George Allen, head football coach at Whittier College for the past six years, has resigned his position effective June 1.

Allen submitted his resignation to President Paul S. Smith and Dr. W. Roy Newsom, director of the athletic board, on January 2 before leaving for St. Louis where he is presently attending the American Football Coaches convention.

Full Time in Coaching

Allen states: "My decision to leave Whittier College is based solely on a desire to spend my full time in coaching football. It has been a real pleasure to work here. I have found many happy friendships with members of the faculty, student body, alumni, and especially the fine men on our football teams. Although I have enjoyed my teaching assignments as a professor of physical education, I would prefer giving up teaching for my first love which is coaching."

Although Allen is presently considering several offers, his plans for the future are as yet undecided.

President's Statement

President Smith, upon receiving Allen's resignation said, "I am sorry to see George Allen leave, but for a man who loves coaching as much as he does, I can appreciate his desire to want to spend his full time in coaching. I believe there are few men who have as complete a knowledge and sense of organization of the game of football as George Allen."

Allen has also brought recognition to Whittier College through his numerous writings on football. His "Encyclopedia of Football Drills," published by Prentice Hall, now in its second edition, has been used widely by coaches not only in the U. S. but also in Canada.

He has in recent years served on the Rules Committee, the Motion Picture Committee and the Ways and Means Committee for Restoring Football at Institutions of the National American Football Coaches Association.

Dr. Smith Goes To Inauguration

President Paul Smith left Tuesday for Washington, D.C., where he will attend the inauguration of President Eisenhower and Vice President Nixon. He will also visit Philadelphia, New York and Chicago, before returning to Whittier Jan. 22.

He will visit with alumni groups en route, and will wind up the trip with the Inauguration, Monday, Jan. 21.

Allen Boasts 32 Poet Wins

In his six years at Whittier College, George Allen has led his teams to a record of 32 wins, 21 losses and five ties. In the SCAAC his teams have lost only seven games in 24 contests, giving the Poets one conference championship, four second places and one third place.

His best year was 1952 when the Poets came as close to an undefeated season as any team in the history of the college, losing only to Fresno State, 14-7 in the last game of the season. During this nine-win, one-loss season Whittier led the nation for pass interceptions.

8-2 Season Record

His second best season was in 1955 when the team ended with an 8-2 record and rated second in the nation among small colleges in pass defense. Allen's only losing season at Whittier was in his first year.

He helped bring recognition to Whittier by guiding his teams to impressive wins over some of the finest small college teams on the Pacific Coast, including Cal Poly, San Diego State, Chico State, San Francisco State and Santa Barbara.

Articles on Football

Allen is presently working on a new book on football at the request of his publishers. His articles on football have appeared in "The American Weekly," "This Week Magazine," "Fortune," "People Today," "Athletic Journal," "Scholastic Coach," "Coach and Athlete," and "The Physical Educator."

Coach Allen received his AB and MS from the University of Michigan, where he was a disciple of Fritz Chrisler, graduating in 1947. He coached at Ann Arbor High School and Morning-side College before coming to Whittier.

Nine Concerts On Choir Tour

"30"

In frenzied journalistic lingo, "30" means the end of a story, and so it is appropriate that we use this symbol for this our last venture in the editorial columns of the Quaker Campus. With this issue our hectic year as boy editor—sometimes referred to as two semesters of treason—comes to a close.

In our life, at least, it is the close of an era, but for the paper it may very well be the dawning of a new era. And perhaps for more than just the Q-C a new era is upon us; perhaps we can see over the not too distant horizon a new spirit in student government. In our small way we have tried during the past year to do what we could to foster this realization that we are in a political body and perhaps this isn't bad after all.

One Word of Caution.

We have only one more word to impart, a word of caution. Institutions are never changed or altered successfully for purely idealistic reasons. Change comes only with a need for change, and the need is rarely for revolutionary, sweeping change. None of us are here for more than four years, which is all too short a period to effect a total revision of our student institution. Retain your idealistic goal, but implement it only as the need arises, and be satisfied that you have done your part, whether it seems like much at the time or not.

For our part, we are satisfied. We have been wrong sometimes; we feel we have been right sometimes, but, most importantly, we have made every effort to be sincere and representative. The question that arises in our mind is, why have we been motivated along the lines we have taken in our editorial and political policies. The answer is contained in a line from Ezra Pound's poem "Ancient Music"

"Goddamm, Goddamm, 'tis why I am, Goddamm"

The Q-C has been part of our personality, it has represented the way we think and give cognizance to need. But after a year it is now someone else's turn to say "Goddamm, 'tis why I am, Goddamm" And that's "30."

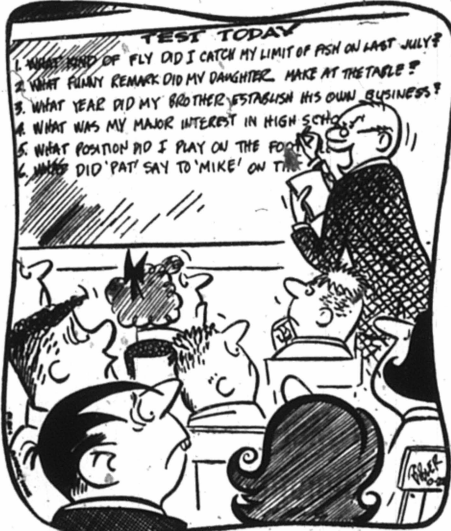
SANDY and RON

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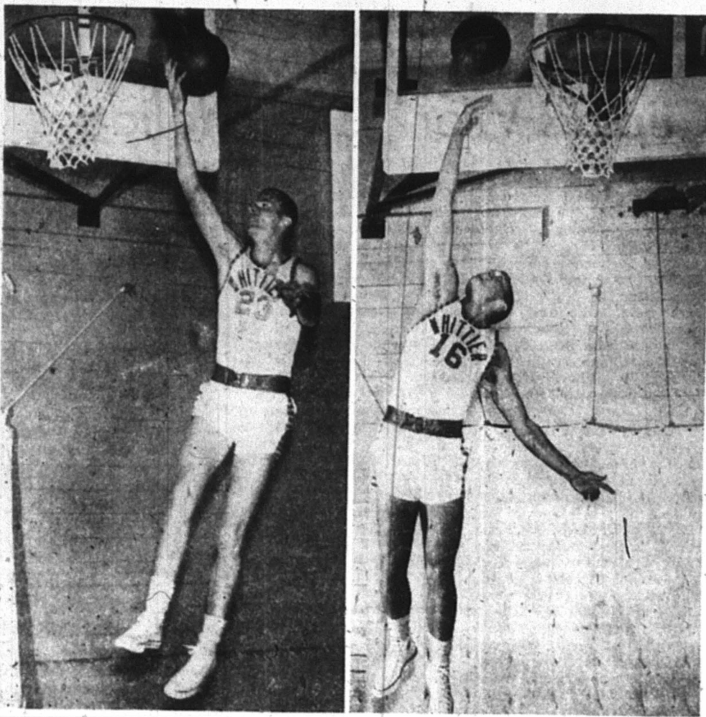
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Sagehens Suffer 20-Point Defeat

The Poets opened SCIAC play with a successful venture to Pomona-Claremont last weekend, downing the Sagehens 73-58. It was the Poet's largest winning margin of the year.

In the early minutes of the game Whittier took an impressive lead, with brilliant offensive tactics. Starters Bob Bland, Chuck Hasley, John Ogle, Earl Reese and Bob Osborn built up a lead which stood up despite the poorer showing of second squadders, who came in mid-way through the first period.

Freshmen Win League Opener

Downing the Pomona-Claremont frosh 70-73, the Poetbabes opened the league season Saturday night. Going into overtime Whittier took a nine point lead, and though the Claremont team started a late rally, it finished on the lower end of the score.

It was evident that the Whittier team had been hurt by the Christmas lay-over, and while working as a well-rounded team the fast break wasn't working too well. Al Balen continued as high point man with 26. For nine games his average now stands at 22.8.

The two guards Bill Hollinger and Bob Mitchell both hit for 14. Bob Sanford rebounded well, and with Bill Hollinger the team managed to contain the Sagechicks.

Pasadena Tournament

Before the holidays at the Pasadena Tournament the frosh fell to a strong Pasadena team, 91-76. For the first quarter of the game Whittier led 22-20, but Pasadena Nazarene came ahead to lead 49-37 at the half. From there on the team coasted to victory.

Balen hit for 30 points to lead the quintet, and was named to the All-Tournament team and received a trophy. Guard, Bill Hollinger contributed to the cause with 15 points, and forward Bill Bount hit for 11.

Orange Coast

In the Orange Coast tournament the frosh went down to the El Toro Marine, 79-77. Whittier finished the game with four men on the court. Both Al Balen, forward, and Bob Mitchell, guard, hit for 16 points to share high point honors for the team.

As sort of a consolation prize the frosh met Oxy and sent the Tigerbats down, 92-66, the next day. Al Balen again was high man with 31 and Bob Sanford, center, hit for 16 points, though he fouled out early in the game.

10-Point Margin Takes Chapman

Chapman College invaded the Whittier gym on Tuesday, Dec. 18, and was turned back by coach Bonham's crew, 62-52, in a game that saw the Poets put on a strong second half drive to come from behind a 35-27 score at half-time, to win the contest.

The Poets were a determined squad as they came back on the floor in the second half, and in 11 minutes they held a slim 45-44 lead and then scored eight points in succession to insure the victory. Individual leader for the Poets was forward Ron Thom who scored 16 points.

HIGH SCORERS for the Poets are Bob Bland and Chuck Hasley. Third in the conference, Bland has scored 152 points for a 13.8 average, and Hasley with 128 points is sixth with an 11.6 average. Bob Zabel placed ninth with 100 points and an even 10 point average. (Statistics are as of Jan. 7.)

Three-Win Record On Christmas Trip

The Whittier hoopsters traveled out of state twice over the vacation period and came away with a three-win, two-loss record.

The Poets defeated Arizona State at Flagstaff in a double-overtime tilt 94-92, and defeated Sacramento State 65-49 to earn third spot in the Nevada Tourney.

The Poets also beat San Francisco State in the tourney, 81-77. The Poet's two losses on the road were at the hands of Arizona State at Tempe, 83-64, and also a loss to Nevada Tourney champ, Nevada University by a 57-45 count.

In the Flagstaff game, Bob Bland was the Poet standout as he poured 26 points through the hoop to pace the Poets to the victory. Bland scored 20 points in the Tempe game to give him a total for the two games of 46 points, or an average of 23 points per game. In the Nevada tourney Bland scored a total of 43 points to lead the Poets.

Against San Francisco State, Bob Zabel led the Poets with a 22-point total. Bland again was the Poet high scorer in the Nevada U. game with 13 points. He also was top scorer in the Sacramento game with 16 points along with Bob Osborn, who also had 16 counters. Zabel and all tourney selection, sat out the Sacramento game due to a sore knee.

The varsity basketball team continues league play between semesters, meeting Redlands and Cal Tech, as well as non-conference foes. Whittier and Redlands were pre-season favorites, and that game here next Tuesday, Jan. 15, will mark the first meeting of the two this season.

Tomorrow (Friday) Cal Poly (SLO) will play in Wardman Gym, and the Poets take on Chapman Tuesday, Jan. 22 there. On Saturday, Jan. 26 Whittier meets Cal Tech in Pasadena and also in Pasadena meets the Poet's arch-rival Pasadena Nazarene on Jan. 29. All games are at 8 p.m.

The Cal Tech game will end the first round of SCIAC play, while the Redlands game will give a good indication of the final outcome of the conference competition.
