## Don Coryell Named New Varsity Coach

Don Coryell has been named Whittier's new Varsity Football coach, according to an announcement by the administration this week. Coryell will replace George Allen, head coach for the Post Varsity Team the past six years, who recently resigned the position.

Alford Ord Coryell used Bud Wilkinson's of Oklahoma, split tee. However, he often changes his formation to fit the talent available.

At present Coryell is the Athletic Director and football coach at Fort Ord, Calif. In 1955 he was head football coach at Wenatchee Valley Junior College, Washington.

## Student Union Ground Broken After State of Union Message Tuesday

Construction of Whittier College's Student Union officially began with the ground breaking ceremonies performed last Tuesday at the site of the building, following the "State of the Union" convocation. Introductions and speeches of local and college guests were followed by the first move toward construction as pickaxes were wielded by A. C. Newsom, mayor of Whittier; Paul S. Smith, president of Whittier College; Ray Dezember, president of ASWC when the Student Union fee was first initiated; and Harvey Charnofsky, ASWC president.

"I would like to extend to the board of trustees, to guests and to everyone, the compliments of Whittier College," stated Dr. Smith.

"For many years the need for a Student Union has been evident. It was not anticipated that its reality would come so soon," remarked Ray Dezember.

The ceremonies were opened with an invocation given by Chaplain Bobilin, and closed with the singing of the Alma Mater. The building should be completed by the spring semester of next year, according to Dr. Smith.

Bill Marumoto, in his "State of the Union" address at convocation, cited the ground breaking of the Student Union and the progress made in the raising of funds for the Memorial Chapel as concrete evidence of the accomplishments of the past year's efforts of student government. "The setting of policy" has also been a major step of student government," he stated.

"Personal development has been an important factor. We feel that we have served well. Though many problems remain unsolved we have brought them to the point where the solution may be found in the near future," Marumoto reported.

Harvey Charnofsky was presented with an enlarged gavel, by Bill Marumoto, symbolizing the great spirit of Whittier College and the office to which he was elected.

Working together in a unified effort is the aim of Charnofsky as ASWC president. He pointed out that plans for the coming year have already been put into motion by the formulating of standing committees.

Charnofsky's address was followed by a moment of silence to "start off the year as a unified Whittier family." The newly elected officers were installed by Doug Smith.

On behalf of Whittier College Bill Marumoto and Doug Smith, out-going president and vice president, were presented with gavels by the new ASWC prexy, Harvey Charnofsky.

## Proposition For Natl. Affiliation

The first Exec meeting of the new administration uncovered an old subject, the affiliation of campus organizations with nationally recognized affiliations.

It was brought to the surface when a constitution of a club of religious nature came up for advisement. The present policy of the student body and the faculty-administration is that campus organizations should not have any national ties outside the campus and must remain autonomous bodies.

Opinions were expressed, on both sides of the issue, some were to set up some kind of standard as to certain types that may be affiliated nationally; to give a blanket approval to religious, occupational and honorary types of aggregations; or to maintain the present policy.

Students with views on this subject are welcome to present them at the next Exec meeting Tuesday night.

Miss Wilson is a veteran of many college theatre productions and she knows her way around the stage. Her ability as an actress is assured and confident and as such, her performance has a professional stability that one rarely sees in amateur productions.

Jim Henderson, in the role of Bouine did a fine job in creating the character of an arrogant and conniving Russian swindler. His performance provided one of the more stable elements of the show. Given the task of creating a character in two comparatively short scenes, Interim Theatre veteran, Gordon Blackmon handled in one of finer performances of the evening. His characterization of the distinctly Russian Counselor Drivnitz was a sharp and clear study in many ways worthy of the professional stage.

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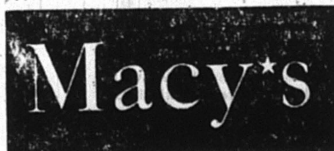
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# Klepfer 2-Hitter Paces Poet Win

Southpaw Ron Klepfer pitched brilliant two hitter as the Whittier College baseball team won its opening game in Southern California Interscholastic Athletic Conference play from Pomona-Claremont 4-1, Tuesday afternoon at Pomona.

The Poet horseholders meet defending SCIAC co-champion Occidental College tomorrow at Eagle Rock. Game time is 2 p.m. Tuesday afternoon at 2 p.m., the Allmen meet the University of Redlands nine on the Poet diamond.

Klepfer had a no-hitter going into the seventh inning until Pomona-Claremont got a single. The other hit was also a single in the ninth inning.

## Poet Swimmers Host Redlands

Whittier meets Redlands in the annual Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference swimming meet Tuesday in the Palm Park pool.

The meet begins at 4 p.m. The two schools competed against one another Friday night in the SCIAC Relays at Redlands with the Bulldogs outscoring the Poets.

Coach Elmer Johnson's defending-champion Whittier team finished fifth in the relays behind the fourth place Redlands aggregation.

Caltech capped the closing relay to slip by second place Occidental and third place Pomona-Claremont.

Leading the Poet batsmen in hitting was co-captain and left-fielder Bruce Caldwell with a double and a home run as the Whittier nine got but five hits.

In the third inning after first baseman Bob Osborn singled, Caldwell hit the homer to score two runs. During the seventh Osborn walked, Caldwell doubled, and catcher Milt Stark singled to score Osborn. Shortstop Jim Olson bunted on a squeeze to bring in Caldwell and the game ended with the score 4-1.

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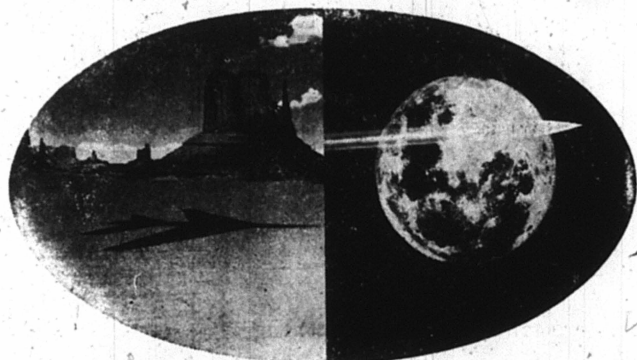
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
