## PROF PERSONALITY SKETCHES

Dr. Albert Upton — — — Dr. Paul Smith

Dr. Albert William Upton, recently named Consultant in General Education at Whittier College, was born in 1897—and says he is "not embarrassed to admit it"—in Denver, Colorado. He got his B.A. from the University of Denver and his Ph.D. at Berkeley. While working for his degree, he was first a fellow, then an associate, in teaching. Returning from travels abroad, he found no instructorships open, so in the fall of 1929 he came to Whittier College. After a year, he lost interest in Berkeley, and has never since thought of leaving Whittier, "except when the administration is unsympathetic."

His course in Basic Communications started in 1936, under the name of "Significs," and was a part of the Social Science program. Dr. Upton estimates that he has taught the course to between four and five thousand freshmen, and remarks:

"Although not all of them are alive, I don't believe Basic Communications to have been the cause of death for any of them."

**Design for Thinking**, his only book, was first published in 1938 as a text for the semantic approach to language study, there being no other book on the subject at the time. It has gone through seven editions. Feeling that the book is neither finished yet, nor satisfactory, he has seen to it that only enough copies are printed for each freshman class, and that it is used in no other college.

Dr. Paul Smith, President of Whittier College, has been a member of the Whittier Family since 1923 when he joined the faculty as Professor of American History. Dr. Smith was born in Richmond, Indiana. He was graduated from Earlham College and received his M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Wisconsin. Dr. Smith is married, and his daughter, Eleanor, is a Whittier graduate.

As Professor of Sophomore Social Science, Dr. Smith was known for his dynamic and interesting lectures. As one former student described him, "He used every trick in the book to catch our attention, from standing on a table or step-ladder, to lecturing in a whisper. And there was a humbleness in his manner that made us realize that his actions were only to emphasize the important material. He always told us that we would remember the important points of his lectures, and I still do."

Dr. Smith became President of Whittier College in 1961. He believes that serenity in life is the result of a well-rounded education based on the liberal arts. His work as president involves representing Whittier College, and being in charge of all facets of college organization. As Dean Harold Spencer says, "It is really the job of four men in one." And yet, as busy as he is, Dr. Smith can always be counted on for a friendly smile and hello.
