

PROF PERSONALITY SKETCHES Dr. Paul Smith

Dr. Albert Upton

Dr. Albert William Upton, recently named Consultant in General Education at Whittier College, was born in 1897-and save "not embarrassed to admit it"-in Denver, Colorado, He got his B.A. from the University of Denver and his Ph.D. at Berkeley. Whie working for his de-gree, he was first a fellow, then an associate, in teaching. Return ing from travels abroad, he found ng tron travels aerosa, he round no instructorships open, so in The fall of 1929 he came to Whit-ther College, After a year, he lost interest in Berkeley, and has nev-

er since thought of leaving Whit-tier. "except when the adminis-tration is unsympathetic."

Tration is unsympathetic." His course in Basic Communi-cations started in 1936, under the name of "Sigrifics," and was a part of the Social Science pro-gram. Dr. Uptor estimates that he best inder the sources to be he has taught the course to be tween four and 'five thousand freshmen, and remarks:

"Although not all of them are alive, I din't believe Basic Communications to have been the cause of death for any of them.⁴

Design for Thinking, his only book, was first published in 1938 as a text for the semantic ap-proach to language study, there being no other book on the sub ject at the time. It has gone through seven editions. Feeling that the book is neither finished vet, nor satisfactory, he has seen to it that only enough copies are printed for each freshman class and that it is used in no other college.




