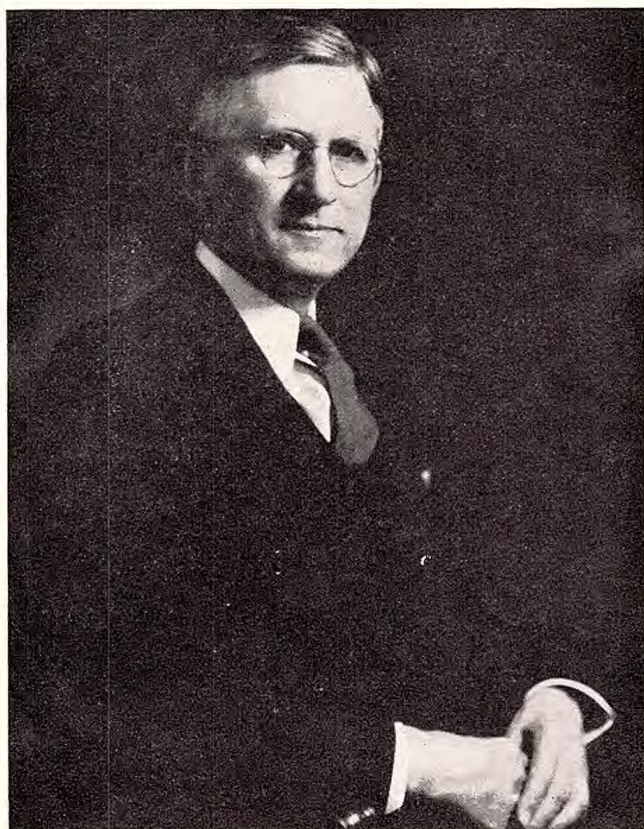

## A President Returns . . .



Dr. Harry Noble Wright, former Whittier College president and present head of C.C.N.Y., will give the 1947 Commencement Address at Whittier College, June 14.

### FORMER PRESIDENT TO RETURN FOR COMMENCEMENT ADDRESS

President of Whittier College from 1918 to 1923, and now head of one of the largest colleges in the United States, Dr. Harry Noble Wright, 1947 Commencement speaker at the college, can be placed among the leading educators of the nation today.

Sixth president of the College of the City of New York, Dr. Wright took his present post during the troubled days of World War II. His program at C.C.N.Y. during the war was hailed by the American Council on Education as a model for other institutions to follow.

Dr. Wright was born on a farm near Shelbyville, Indiana, in 1881. In his eighteenth year, he matriculated at Earlham College, and received his A.B. degree from there in 1904. From 1904 to 1905, he was professor of mathematics at Pacific College in Oregon.

After dropping out of education for three years, Dr. Wright joined the Whittier College faculty in 1908. After two years at Whittier, he accepted a fellowship in mathematics at the University of California where he received his Master's degree in astronomy in 1911. Two years later, he won his doctorate in the philosophy of mathematics.

In 1917, Dr. Wright returned to Whittier College as Dean, and a year later, became president of the

## Baccalaureate Speaker . . .



Bishop James Chamberlain Baker

### OUTSTANDING RELIGIOUS LEADER TO GIVE BACCALAUREATE TALK.

One of the nation's outstanding religious leaders will be on the Whittier campus, June 8, when Bishop

James Chamberlain Baker of the California Area of the Methodist Church delivers the 1947 Baccalaureate address in the First Friends Church of Whittier.

Holder of nine degrees from seven colleges and universities, Dr. Baker has been active as a college professor, pastor, missionary, educator, and YMCA executive since his graduation from Illinois Wesleyan University in 1898.

In addition to his A.B. degree from Illinois Wesleyan, Dr. Baker holds the degree of Bachelor of Sacred Theology from Boston University (1905); a Doctor of Divinity degree from Illinois Wesleyan (1913), the degree of Doctor of Laws from Illinois Wesleyan (1928), Cornell College (1930), Ohio Wesleyan (1931), College of the Pacific (1934), and the University of Southern California (1940); and the degree of Doctor of Humanities from Boston University (1943).

A professor of Greek at Missouri Wesleyan College from 1898 to 1902, Dr. Baker entered the Methodist-Episcopal ministry in 1900.

In 1928, the religious leader was elected a Bishop in the Methodist Church and supervised mission work in Japan, Korea, and Manchuria for several years.

Dr. Baker was elected vice-chairman of the International Missionary Council in 1938, and was chosen chairman of the group in 1941, a post which he still holds.

He served as a consultant at the United Nations Conference in San Francisco in 1945.

Outstanding for his educational interests, Dr. Baker is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Pacific School of Religion, the College of the Pacific, and the University of Southern California.

At present, the 1947 Baccalaureate speaker is chairman of the Advanced Program Committee of the YMCA, and of the Division of Educational Institutions of the Methodist Board of Education, a post he has held since 1944.

### COMMEMORATION CEREMONY HELD FOR ORIGINAL ACADEMY; BRONZE PLAQUE DEDICATED

Over half a century of educational building was commemorated in Whittier, May 16, when Whittier College sponsored the unveiling of a bronze plaque on the site of the original Whittier Academy, founded in 1888 by far-seeing Whittier citizens.

Preceded by a ceremony in the Roxy Theater, the unveiling was done by Miss Dell Coryell, pupil in the primary department of the original Whittier Academy, and Miss Jackie Clarkson, secretary of the present Whittier College student body.

Dr. Herbert E. Harris, professor of English emeritus at the college, briefly reviewed the 59-year history of Whittier College since the founding of the Academy in 1888, in the program at the Roxy Theater.

Mrs. Mattie Gregg, a student at the original Academy who returned to Whittier College for her degree in 1938, told of some of the hardships encountered in the founding of the institution.

Dr. William C. Jones, president of Whittier College, introduced several guests including C. B. John-

son, principal of the second Whittier Academy and former president of the college Board of Trustees; Dr. W. V. Coffin (principal of the third Academy and for 18 years president of the college Board; Ashton Otis, present head of the Board of Trustees; Dr. Herbert Francis Evans, professor of religion, emeritus; Miss Dell Coryell; Jack Brownell, present Whittier College student body president; and Miss Jackie Clarkson.

Following the brief ceremony at the Roxy Theater, the group adjourned across Philadelphia Street to the Evans Building, 212 East Philadelphia, site of the original Whittier Academy, where Miss Coryell and Miss Clarkson, representing the earliest and most recent classes at Whittier, joined in unveiling the plaque.

The commemoration plaque reads simply: 'Whittier Academy, Which Became Whittier College, First Convened In This Building, April 2, 1888,' but only those who have followed the rise of Whittier College through the years from that day of long ago can know of the heartaches and the disappointments, the joy and the laughter contained in those few words, dedicated to the coming of higher education to Whittier.



## ALUMNI LUNCHEON TO FEATURE TALK BY CAPT A. R. BEHNKE, '25

### Back to Quaker Town



Captain Albert R. Behnke, '25, will return to Alma Mater to give the Alumni Luncheon Address, June 14.

Known to his many Whittier College friends as just plain "Al," Albert R. Behnke, principal speak-

er at the Alumni Luncheon scheduled for 12:30 p. m., June 14, in the Campus Inn, has gone far since his graduation from the college in 1925.

Official title of the former Whittier student is now Albert R. Behnke, Captain, Medical Corps, United States Navy, and he is the research executive of the Naval Medical Research Institute, National Naval Medical Center, Bethesda, Maryland.

Following his graduation from Whittier College in 1925, Captain Behnke entered the Stanford University School of Medicine and received his medical degree from there in 1930.

Immediately following his interne year, he entered Dr. Brinker's laboratory in the Harvard School of Public Health as a research fellow, working on problems dealing with exposure to high pressures.

In 1939, having previously entered the Navy as a research physiologist, the Whittier graduate participated in the five months of res-

cue and salvage operation incident to the U. S. S. Squalus disaster.

During World War II Captain Behnke carried on extensive investigations in the applied physiology of respiration under high altitude, surface, and deep sea conditions, and has been connected with the investigative work at the Naval Medical Research Institute since its foundation.

In 1942, he was given the honorary degree of Master of Science at Yale University.

Early in World War II, Dr. Behnke was Harvey Lecturer on Aviation Medicine before the New York Academy of Medicine, and more recently has given the Wyck-off lectures at New York University.

Despite the honor heaped upon him by various educational institutions, however, despite his promotion to a high naval rank, Albert R. Behnke does and always will remain in the hearts of his many friends from Whittier College as just plain "Al."

## ANNUAL BACH, BRAHMS FESTIVALS DRAW SOUTHLAND MUSIC LOVERS

Two of Southern California's outstanding musical events of the year were presented at Whittier College this semester in the Tenth Annual Bach Festival, April 20, 26, and 27, and the Eighth Annual Brahms Festival, May 10.

The Bach Festival, presented in a series of four concerts, featured work by nine ensemble groups, six student soloists, and faculty and guest artists.

The Brahms Festival, presented in a single concert because of the crowded concert schedule, was presented by two groups, and three soloists.

Founded by Miss Margaretha Lohmann, head of the college music department, on the two cornerstones that Bach is the greatest single influence on modern music, and that great music should be presented simply for the love of that music, the Bach Festivals have proven so popular that larger quarters were necessary for this year's presentation. Three of the four concerts were presented in the Whittier Women's Clubhouse, and the fourth was held in the First Friends Church.

The Brahms Festival was held in

the Great Hall of the O. T. Mendenhall Building and featured solo performances by Marjorie Searle, '46, Aubrey Hancock, '47, and Robert Boucher, '50. Other artists appearing in the concert were: Marjorie Lewis, '44, Carolyn Burns, '49, LuRuth Anderson, Catherine Mills, '47, and Eugene M. Riddle and MaryO Van Deman of the college faculty.

Two numbers heard in this year's Annual Bach Festival were presented in the First Bach Festival at Whittier College and several others were heard for the first time at a Whittier College Festival. Repeated from previous performances were Bach's two-piano and four-piano concerti, duo-violin sonata, Brandenburg Concerti Numbers I and III, and the D Major Piano Concerto.

While the scores of Bach are unmistakable, the Whittier College Festivals serve to show the great variety and profound musical content of his work.

Featured as a guest soloist in the fourth concert of this year's Bach Festival was Laurence Petran, organist from U.C.L.A.

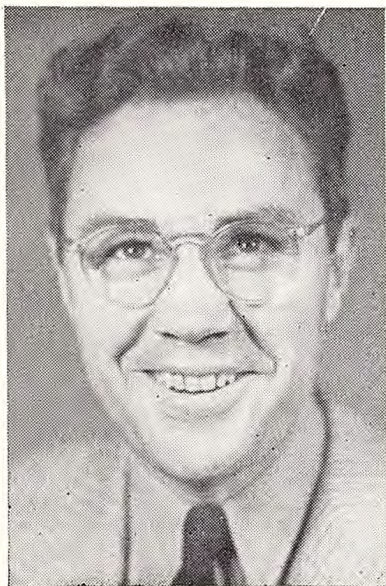


Miss Margaretha Lohmann, head of the Music Department, is the originator and planner of the Bach and Brahms Festivals each year.

## A Clinic Is Born . . .

### New Speech Correction Clinic Scheduled This Summer on Campus

Designed to aid in curing speech defects of both children and adults, a speech correction clinic, headed by Dr. Herold Lillywhite, professor of speech, will be established at Whittier College this summer. The clinic will remain in operation five weeks, beginning June 16 and ending July 18, and will reopen in September.

Opening date of the clinic was moved forward from September, as originally planned, in response to the great demand throughout the southland for help with speech defects.

The clinic will be equipped to treat all forms of speech defects including stuttering, minor spastics, aphasics, cleft palate cases, articulatory defects, those with delayed or no speech, and hard of hearing speech cases.

A special hearing device for use in teaching speech sounds to hard of hearing cases through voice recordings will be used.

Dr. Lillywhite, director of the clinic, was formerly director of the nationally-known speech correction clinic at the College of the Pacific. He will be assisted at Whittier by several trained speech clinicians

### Foundation Society Enjoys Annual Spring Outing

The Foundation Society enjoyed its regular annual spring outing over the week-end of March 29 and 30. The trip was one of considerable interest as it was of an exploratory nature into new country. ## QUAKER NINE OUTCLASSES FOES AS CONFERENCE BASEBALL RACE APPROACHES END OF 1947 SEASON

The word for the Southern California Intercollegiate Conference baseball race is "sewed up" as far as the Whittier College horsehide squad is concerned these days.

At this writing, the Quakers are riding an 11-game winning streak with six wins and no losses in conference play.

To date this year, the Poets have scored 80 runs in S.C.I.C. competition against 21 for their combined opponents. Averaged out, the records show Whittier averaging 13.33 runs per conference game against a 3.50 run-per-game average for the combined teams of Oxy, Pomona, Redlands, and Caltech.

At press time, Whittier College has two games remaining this season, both of them conference tilts. The Poets still have to meet the Caltech Beavers and the Redlands Bulldogs. The Quaker nine swamped Caltech, 15-1, in the first round, and trampled Redlands, 10-1. That's why the word around Whittier for the S.C.I.C. baseball race this year is "sewed up."

Led by Shortstop Bob Tuttle with a batting average of .463, the Quakers at press time are averaging .281 in winning 17 games and losing seven. The locals dropped decisions to Compton College twice, Fullerton J. C., Santa Barbara College, San Diego State, Pasadena J. C., and Pepperdine College. They came back to beat both Fullerton and Pepperdine in later games.

# QUAKER BASKETBALL SQUAD TRAMPLES LOUISIANA; LOSES TO MISSOURI IN KANSAS CITY TOURNAMENT

Sixteen Whittier College men boarded a Southern Pacific train at the Union Station in Los Angeles last March 6.

Their destination? Kansas City, Missouri, and the 1947 National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball tournament—for these sixteen men were Quaker casaba players Bob Tuttle, Gene Martin, Bill Moore, Gordon Pedersen, Carl Sherwood, Don Wardman, Ray Hooper, Harold Turley, Albert Waer, Dick Erbe, Phil Campbell, and Jack Barton, winners of the S.C.I.C. title and holders of one of the outstanding records on the Pacific Coast, and their coach, Aubrey Bonham, Bob Fisher, student manager, Ed Paterson, graduate manager, and G. Duncan Wimpers, director of public relations.

Early Saturday morning, March 8, the Whittier College group arrived in Kansas City and checked in at the Continental Hotel. The squad worked out that afternoon, and the next day on the floor of the Rockhurst College gym in Kansas City. They looked good, considering their week lay-off.

A quick check revealed that Whittier was scheduled to play at 4 o'clock, Monday afternoon, March 10. The Northwestern Louisiana State College five were to be the first Quaker opponents.

Whittier flashed into the lead

with the starting whistle the next afternoon. Led by big Bill Moore and Jean Martin, playing his best game of the year, the Poets ran up a 20-7 lead in the first quarter.

Louisiana came to life in the second quarter, however, and as the Quakers relaxed, matched the Whittier effort to knot the score at halftime at 27-all.

Whittier rooters in the stands, led by "Buck" Newsom, '42, weren't disappointed, however, as the Quakers turned on their famous second-half drive to win going away, 70-56.

After a rest on Tuesday, the Poets once more took the floor Wednesday evening. This game they met the towering Northeast Missouri State Teachers College squad, a team with a season record of 28 wins and one loss.

Utilizing their average height of 6'3", the Missouri squad took an early lead and made the Quakers fight to catch them through the initial half. The Poets, rallying gallantly, pulled up with the Kirksville five at halftime to tie the count, oddly enough, at 27-all, the same halftime score as in their first game.

With the crowd on its feet through most of the second stanza, the score see-sawed back and forth with first one team, then the other, in the lead. Whittier, still bother-

ed by the tremendous height of the Missouri squad, handled the ball beautifully, but lacked their customary sharpness in shooting.

From the beginning of the final quarter, the teams were never more than three points apart. Whittier had been in the lead seven times, and Kirksville, seven. Blasting the hoop in a desperate attempt to tie the score the Poets brought the total to 51-49 in the last 30 seconds of play, but Kirksville, controlling the ball, kept it away from the California squad until the final gun, to win by two slim points.

Whittier lost the game on the free throw line. Both the Poets and Kirksville scored 20 field goals for 40 points each. The Quakers, however, made only nine out of 16 free throws, while Missouri made 11 out of 14 to win.

The 1947 Whittier College squad need never be ashamed of that loss, however. The reports going out after the game confirmed their gallantry on the hardwood floor.

In the story of the Whittier-Kirksville game, Associated Press wrote: "The Whittier College boys, with fight in their hearts and india rubber in their legs, outplayed the taller Kirksville team all the way." This tribute, from an unconcerned third party, is one of which Whittier College may well be proud through the years.

## Quaker Spikesters Break Old Tradition; Finish Fourth in S.C.I.C.

The Poet thinclads finished fourth in S.C.I.C. competition, one step ahead of last place Cal Tech, but Coach Aubrey Bonham wrote off his team's 1947 track season as a success. This year's squad broke an old Poet tradition of last place ownership by beating Cal Tech, for one thing, but their proudest achievement was the shattering of three school records. Only Whittier's greatest track team, the 1937 outfit, possesses more school marks for one year.

All the shattered records occurred in field events and all were surpassed on the athlete's last at-

tempt. ASB Prexy, Jack Brownell was first field record breaker, adding 1¼ inches to Terrell Myer's broad jump mark of 23' ¾", set in 1940 at San Diego. Jack soared 23' 2" in the Cal Tech meet to defeat the Beaver's ace, Elroy Chinn.

One week later in the All-Conference meet at Pomona, well-muscled Joe Feary, a gift from Compton C. C., erased Morry Lingenfelte's 10 year old shot put mark of 43' 7" by tossing the 16 pound pellet 44' 4⅜" to nab third place on his last attempt.

Ten days after the All-Conference, Whittier met Redlands in a makeup meet and the Poet's well-liked captain, Hal Turley, battered the discus mark he had been approaching all year. Turley's spin of 140' 4" replaced Lyman Diet-

rich's mark of 137' 8", which was another 1937 record. Turley also bettered the shot put mark which had stood before Feary cracked it, and finished a terrific afternoon by tossing the javelin 188' 4" to approach John Dell's 192' record.

Other outstanding, but not record breaking, marks for the current season include Fred Barton's two 9.9s hundreds, Fuzz White's 6' 2" high jump, and Earl Strahl's 15.2s high hurdle race.

In a final recapitulation, the Poets met nine foes, defeated three of them and lost to six—including one league win out of four meets. Their best performance came at mid-season when, on successive Saturdays, they humbled Pasadena College, 99-25, and upset Cal Tech 67 2/3-63 1/3.



## Whittier College Racqueteers Break Even in 1947 Play

At press time, the Whittier College tennis squad is resting precisely in the middle of everything as far as conference play is concerned. To date, the Poet racqueteers have won three, lost three, and tied one.

Led by Captain Morris Hanberg, the Quakers have downed teams from Caltech, 9-0, and 5-4; and Occidental, 5-4. They have lost to Pomona, 2-7, and 1-8; and to Redlands, 4-5. A match with Occidental had to be called on account of darkness with the score even, so it was decided to split the remaining points, making the final score  $4\frac{1}{2}$ - $4\frac{1}{2}$ .

Redlands, winner of the S.C.I.C. tennis crown for the past 13 years in a row, have already sewed up the title for the fourteenth consecutive year at this writing. The Bulldogs will oppose the Poets in the final match of the year.

college. While head of the Quaker school, the noted educator completely reorganized the Whittier College curriculum and administrative structure. Dr. Wright resigned from his position at Whittier in 1923, and returned for a brief period to the University of California.

Traveling to New York for a year of research and study in 1930, Dr. Wright accepted an invitation to become assistant professor of mathematics at C.C.N.Y. Six years later he was advanced to the associate professorship. In 1939 he became Director of the Evening and Summer sessions, and in February, 1941, upon the resignation of C.C. N.Y. President Nelson P. Mead, he was asked to serve as Acting President. He was inaugurated as President of the college, September 30, 1942.
