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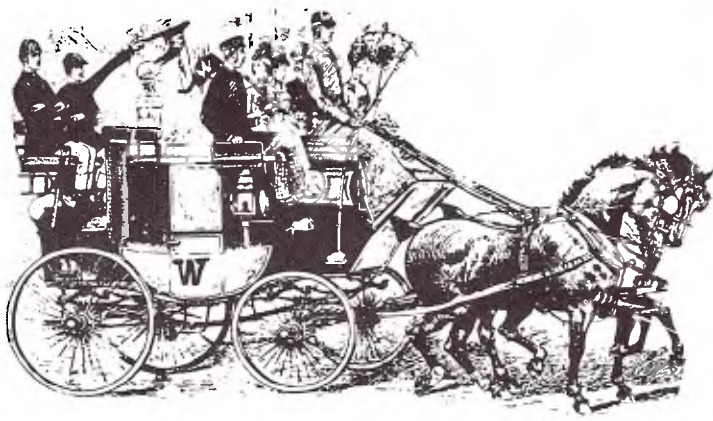

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HOME COMING

The faithful onlooker at many Whittier College homecoming parades would think there had been so many hundreds of floats through the years, nothing original could be forthcoming. But the 1967 Homecoming on November 4, proved differently with eleven societies showing a real talent for originality, humor and beauty. The floats were all excellent. Parade honors for floats added up to this: Sweepstakes to the Mets for "Don't Rain On My Parade," seriousness to the Sachsens for "Circus Maximus," theme to the Franklins for "Under The Big Top," humor to the Ionians for "All Tuckered Out," beauty to the Palmers for their "Merry-go-Round," originality to the Vestician's cross-eyed lion in a cage. For only the second year of competition, dorm decorations were exceptionally fine.

Grads of all ages, independents and society members, thoroughly enjoyed a new homecoming innovation at which 200 attended — the No Host Alumni Reception at the Wm. Penn Restaurant following the game.

Traditional brunches for all societies in the morning, and the afternoon game, with its 27-15 victory over Pomona College, rounded out the day for the Poet people. Sunday saw a hotly contested golf tournament won by Dick Pickup '55 and Ann Martin '65.

Win Hoose '68, general chairman for the student body, assisted by Tony Texiera '68, headed up the weeks of preparation for the big event.



SPORTS ROUND-UP

The schedule was long and arduous, particularly in competition away from the SCIAC. Godfrey's gladiators, in fact, licked only Cal Poly Pomona, 26-14, while losing to five other formidable foes — San Fernando Valley State, 30-7; Northern Arizona University, 46-29; U.C. Santa Barbara, 21-0; Cal Western University, 18-7 and Santa Clara University, 40-13.

But the good old SCIAC was right up the Poets' alley and despite blowing a 29-28 decision for Claremont's first success ever over Whittier, they handled the other league members. Occidental fell, 20-13, on a strong second half rally, while Pomona took gas, 27-15, after the Poets hustled into a 21-0 half-time margin.

Redlands was another story, the game up for grabs right up to the final seconds. Co-captain John Sutherland closed his steady collegiate career in spectacular style by taking sophomore quarterback John Mele's pass in the end zone for the touchdown that subdued stubborn Redlands, 27-26.

The Bulldogs, who nipped the Poets by a point last year to claim the SCIAC title, didn't die gracefully. A Redlands fumble on Whittier's five-yard line was recovered by tackle Les Bursick with a minute showing on the clock, thereby preserving the Poets' gallant comeback.

4 Godfrey loses only five seniors by graduation, perhaps indicating the Poets will be even more formidable next year. The departees are Sutherland, Moore, Mott, Bergenthal and reserve fullback Warren Haines. Leading the 1968 charge will be tackle Bill Weaver and halfback Stewart as co-captains.

Post-season honors continued to flow into Whittier College athletic scrap books long after the 1967 Poet football squad waited until the last five minutes of the regular season to assure Coach John Godfrey of his sixth Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference championship in eight years.

The big noise offensively was the stubby junior halfback, Ross Stewart from Claremont. Despite the most competitive schedule in Poet history, Stewart chewed up 1,020 yards in 228 carries and scored eight touchdowns.

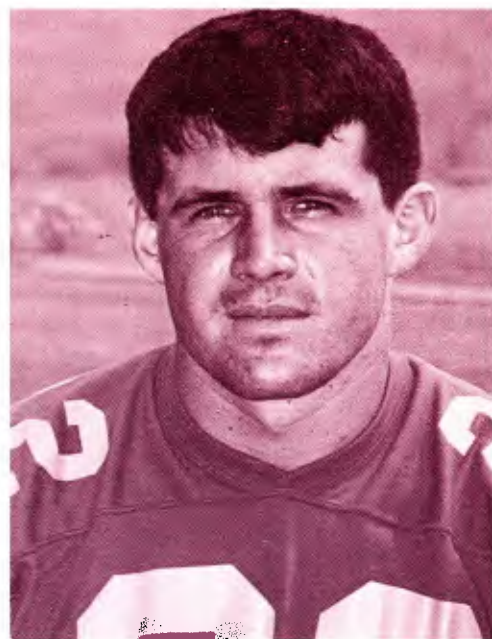
Stewart's achievements were duly recognized. His list of honors included honorable mention on Associated Press Little All-American — one of only two SCIAC players so honored; all-National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) first team; and all-SCIAC first team.

His Poet teammates climaxed the fruitful season by declaring him the most valuable player on the squad. Stewart's 1,020 yards was topped on the Pacific Coast only by Southern California's O. J. Simpson, who rushed for 1,450 yards.

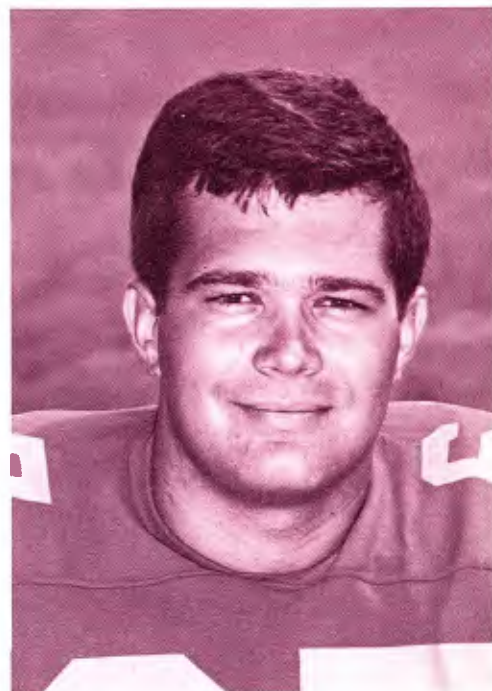
Stewart's blocking tandem of center Dave Newell and co-captain guard Keith Mott also took bows. Mott, a Montebello boy, earned all-American mention from the AP, all-NAIA District III first team and second all-SCIAC team. Newell was first team on both all-District III and all-conference selections.

Middle guard John McCreery made first team all-conference and second team all-NAIA. For defensive halfback Charlie Warrington, it was the same story. Flanker Rich Bergenthal, who shared the pass receiving title with Wally Wooten at 40 catches, gained all-SCIAC first team.

Other Poets recognized were Mac Moore, second all-SCIAC; and Manuel Juarez, second team all-SCIAC. In addition, Mott and Moore were selected by Coach Jack Curtice to play in the Shrine All-Star Potato Bowl at Bakersfield.

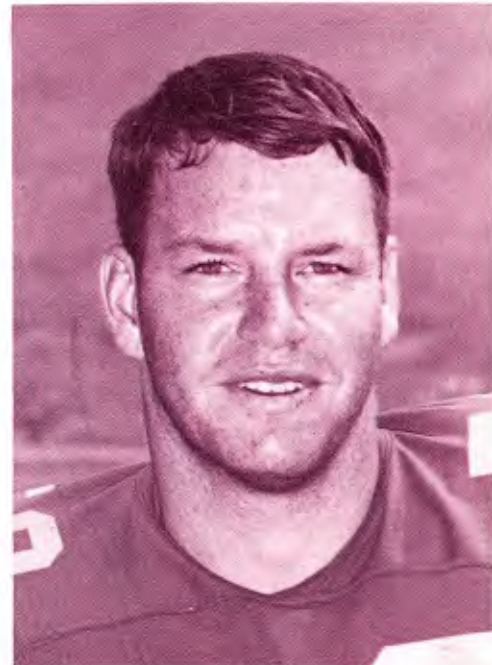

Whittier College Campus

History and Purpose

Whittier College was chartered as a four-year, liberal arts college in 1901, having begun as Whittier Academy in 1888. Like the beautiful city in which it is located, the college was founded by the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers), and was named for the American Quaker poet, John Greenleaf Whittier.

Whittier College today is a fully accredited, co-educational liberal arts college with an enrollment of 1900 and a faculty of approximately 125.

Whittier College

General Information

Curriculum: Whittier College offers a complete liberal arts curriculum leading to the degree of Bachelor of Arts, and graduate curriculum leading to the degree of Master of Arts, Master of Science, and Master of Education.

Among the fields in which either professional or pre-professional training is offered are law, medicine, dentistry, nursing, occupational and physical therapy, business administration, engineering, government service, social work, education, the Christian ministry, and religious education.

Under the "3-2" Engineering Plan a student may attend three

years at Whittier College and two or more at the Engineering School of the University of Southern California, Stanford University, or Colorado State University. By special arrangements with these schools and Whittier, a recommended student receives the B.A. from Whittier and the B.S. from the other school at the end of his five years of study.

In the education field Whittier College is accredited by the California State Board of Education to recommend candidates for credentials in elementary and secondary teaching. The college is also authorized to grant special credentials in men's and women's physical education, speech correction, home economics and music.

Whittier offers specialized courses in the supervision and administration of such youth-serving agencies as the YMCA, the YWCA, the Boy Scouts of America, and the Girl Scouts of America, including supervised field training.

Student Life: There is ample room for an expression of student leadership in the many co-curricular and extra-curricular activities of the college. Included in these are the Student Executive, the Associated Men's Students, the Associated Women's Students, the Quaker Campus (newspaper), the Acropolis (yearbook), departmental honor societies, men's and women's service organizations, band,

choir, orchestra, and many other committees, clubs and organizations.

Social societies at Whittier are open to all students and resident living is provided in residence halls for both men and women.

Whittier College in Copenhagen:

One of the first colleges in the United States to open a campus abroad, Whittier now has in operation Whittier College in Copenhagen, Denmark. Approved students above the freshman level may study abroad at the Copenhagen campus as part of their regular Whittier College studies.

Classes are held exclusively for Whittier students in classrooms of the University of Copenhagen and are taught in English by professors from Copenhagen and Whittier.

Admission Requirements: Regular freshman standing is granted to the student who satisfies the Admissions Committee that he can do acceptable college work. This includes graduation from an accredited high school with a grade of A or B in twelve of the fifteen standard high school units and satisfactory scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test given by the College Entrance Examination Board. High school courses should include three-units of English, two units of a foreign language, one unit of history, one unit of laboratory science, one unit of algebra and one unit of geometry.

Ev Hunt '47 Wins 1195 Spirit Award

The 11-9-5 sports booster club has completed another successful fall breakfast and banquet season this year under President R. Jackson Gauldin '47, assisted ably by Vic Lopez, Jack Mele '43, Lee Woodward '40, Ev Hunt '47, Bill Wagner, Darrell Ryan and Jim Moore. Participation was excellent, with pep talks by Head Football Coach John H. Godfrey. There was exceptional service club cooperation in presenting Player-Of-The Week awards to the outstanding Poet team members. Arvle Dedmon headed up the annual Bar-B-Q, welcoming players and coaches at the beginning of the season. The concluding banquet for parents and wives featured Elvin Hutchison '37, an American Football official, giving an interesting talk on the American Football League. Ev Hunt '47 was presented the 11-9-5 Spirit Award for the letterman best exemplifying the spirit of Whittier College in the past 20 years.

Whittier College Faculty Notes

Dr. Roberta Forsberg, professor of English, has been named to the 1968-1969 edition of "Who's Who In American Women." She has recently completed two books. The first, "Madame de Stael And The English," will be published by Astra Books, New York, this fall. The second manuscript is entitled "The Place Of The Images," a study of imagery in the modern novel.



Dr. Inez Hull, Biology Dept., was one of three California scientists chosen to participate in a conference on Experimental Mammalian Genetics. It was held at Oakes Center, a conference center of Bowdoin College, in Bar Harbor, Maine during August and was sponsored by the Jackson Memorial Laboratory and the National ("March of Dimes") Foundation. Leading authorities in the field from northeastern universities, including a group from Johns Hopkins Medical School headed by Dr. Victor A. McKusick, an authority on human genetics, and members of the staff of Jackson Laboratory, the major center for research in the genetics of the mouse, rabbit and dog, presented recent research and techniques.

Dr. David F. Bender lectured on "Asteroid Encounters on Space Missions" at the California Polytechnic Institute, Pomona, on Oct. 25. His presentation was a part of the Inauguration Week program at that college. Dr. Bender was also invited to give a special lecture on engineering.



Dr. Irene Eber's "Hu Shih and Chinese History: The Problem of cheng-li kuo-ku" was accepted for publication *Monumenta Serica*, 1968 volume. An abstract of this paper by the same title will appear in the *Proceedings* of the 27th Congress of International Orientalists.

Dr. Eber spoke to the University Club in Whittier on "The Great Proletarian Cultural Revolution in Historical Perspective" in September, and in November, she also gave a lecture to the combined League of Women Voters in La Habra on Problems of Communists, Red Guards, and the Great Proletarian Cultural Revolution.

The award is to a geologist who published a paper during the previous year considered an outstanding contribution to the engineering geology profession. It is not given annually, but only when the Association feels a work is of sufficient merit.

Dr. Leighton received the award for his "Land-slides and Hillside Development" published in 1966 in the publication *Engineering Geology* in Southern California, by the Association of Engineering Geologists, Glendale.
