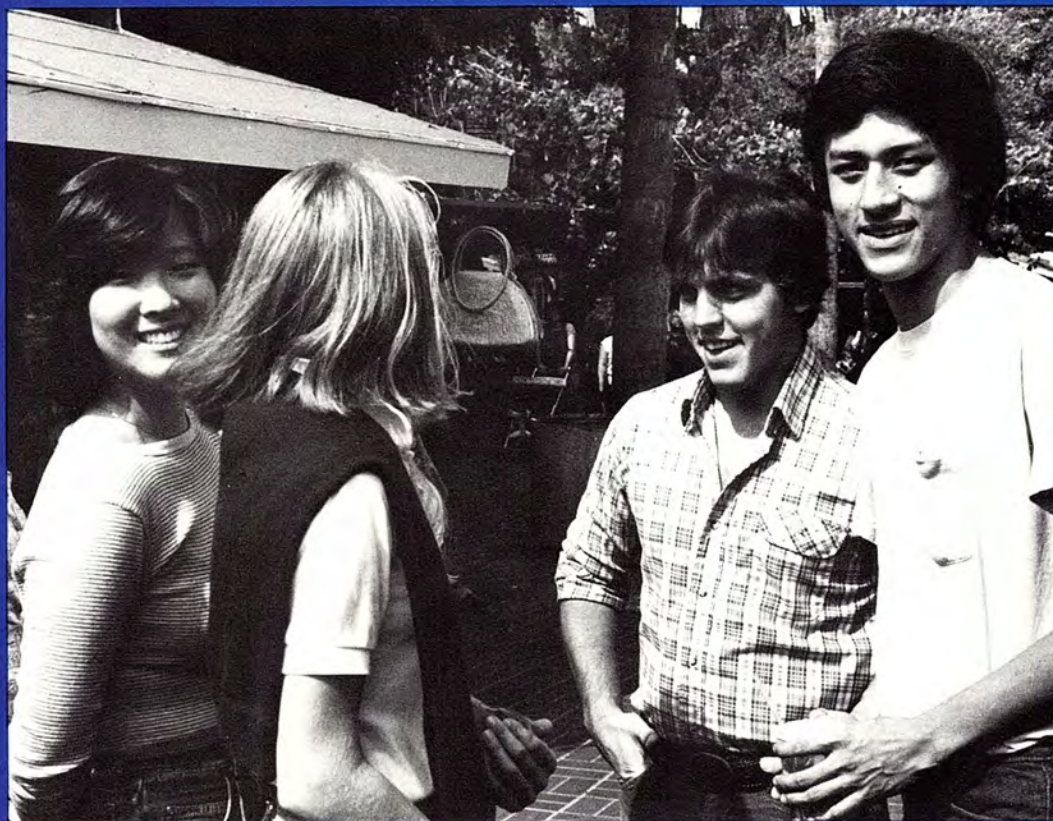


ORIENTATION WEEK

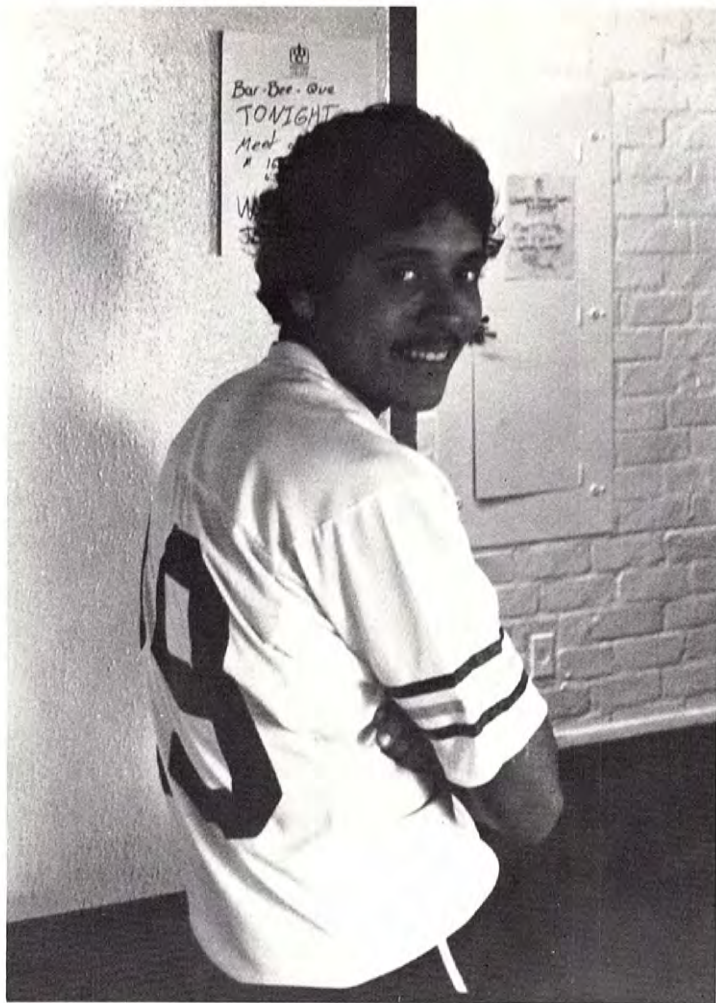


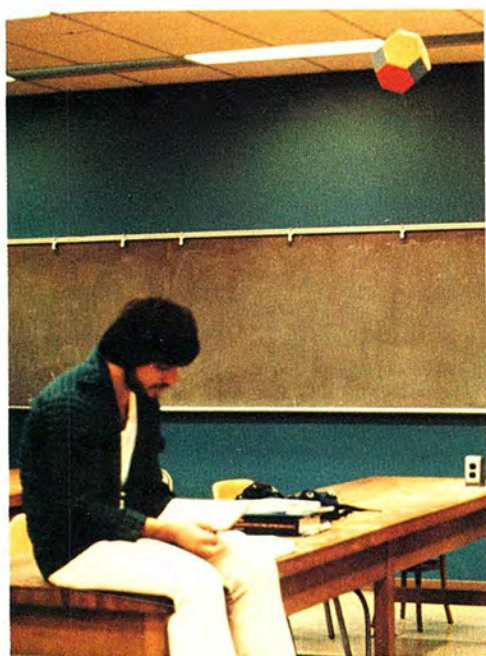
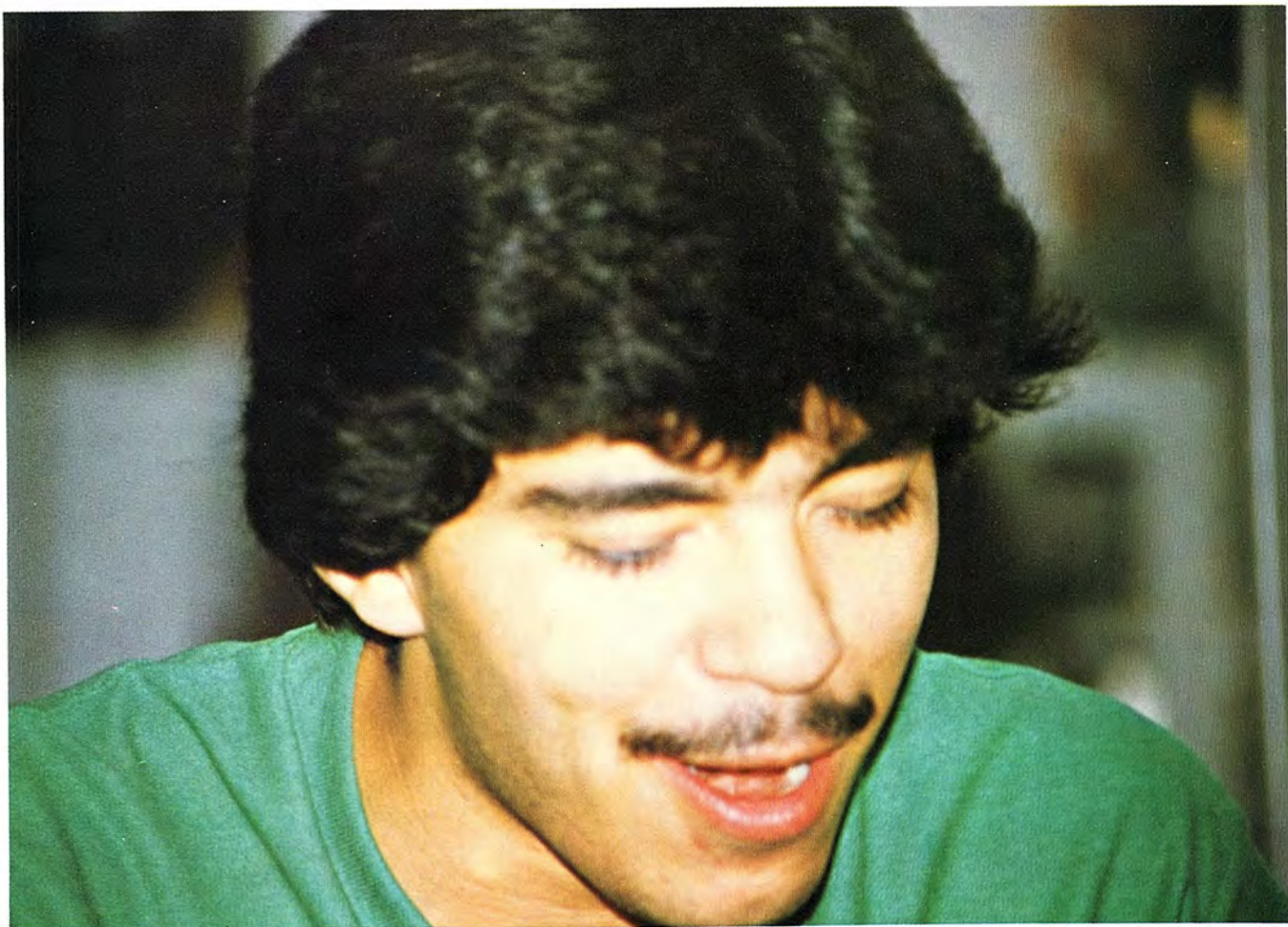




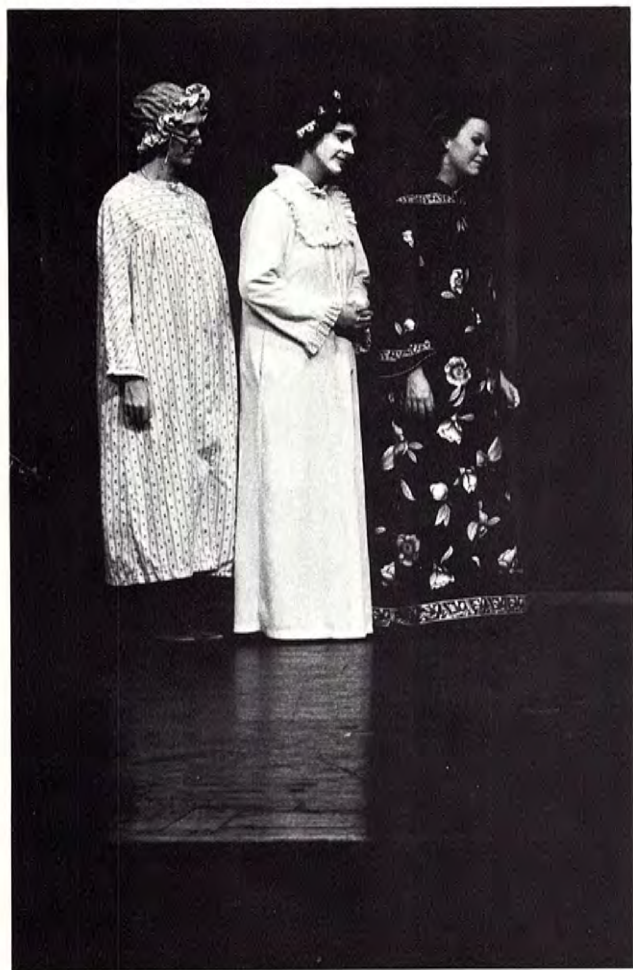










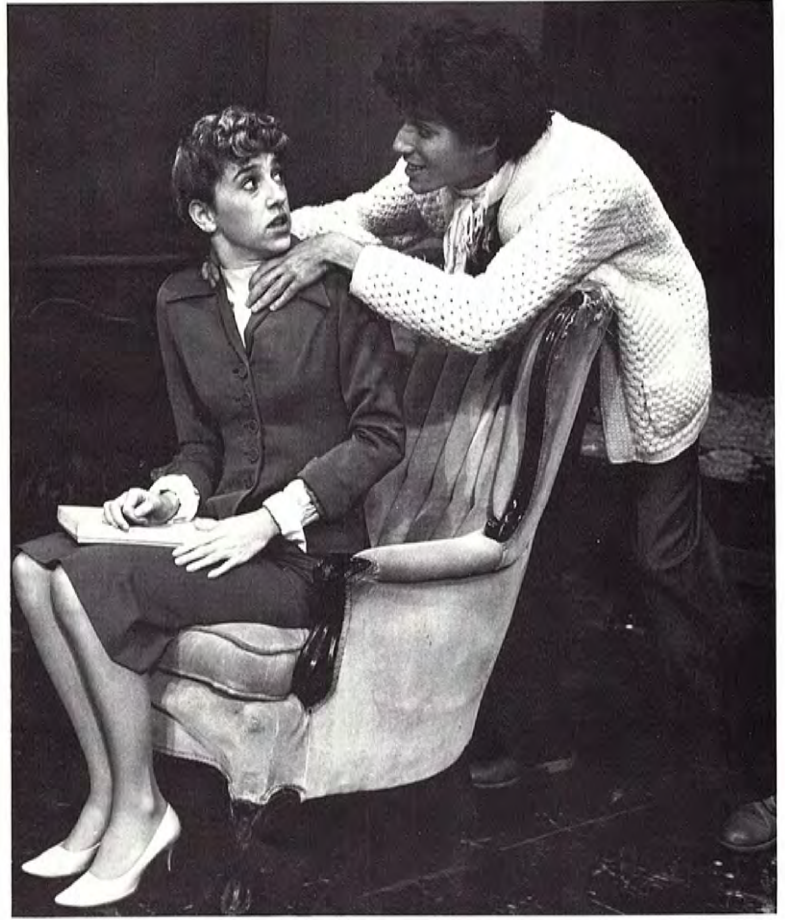




FRIENDS

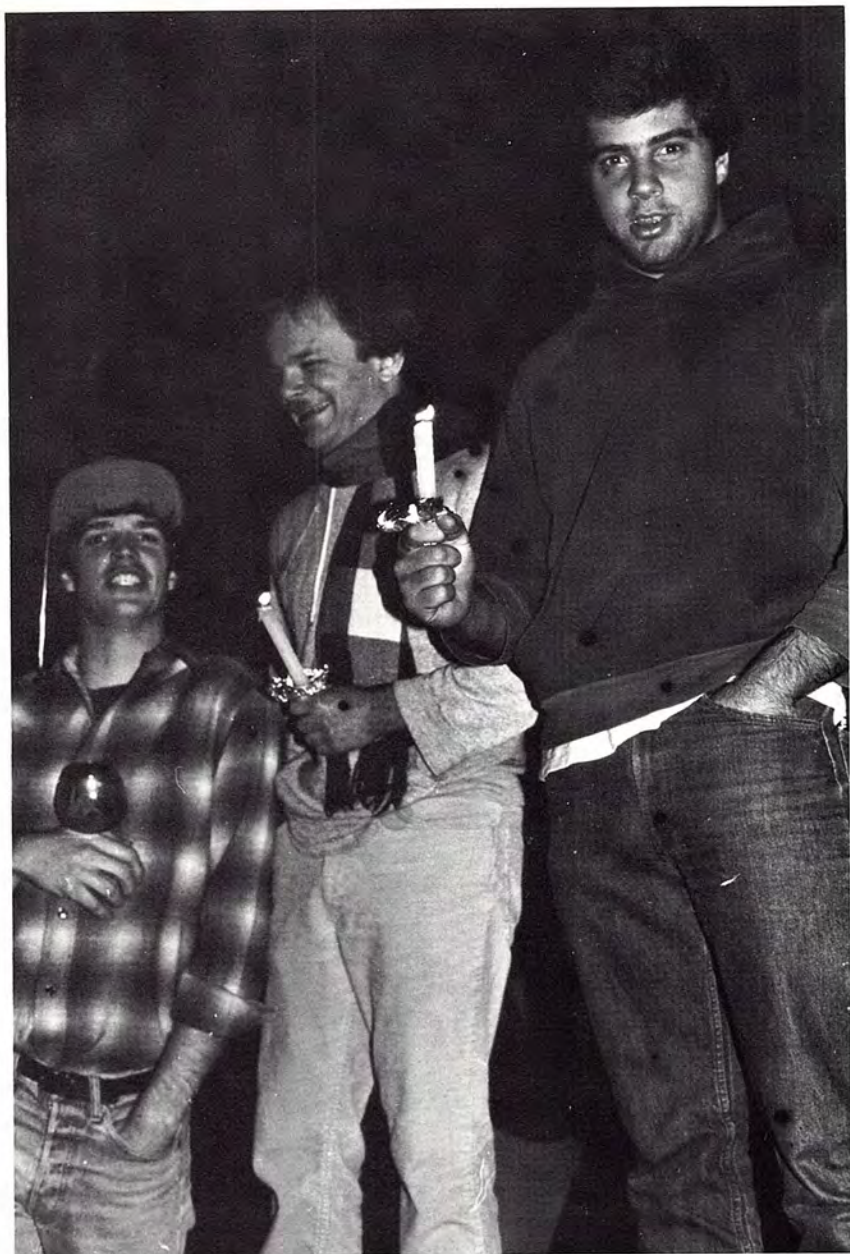




FRANKLIN BAR NIGHT

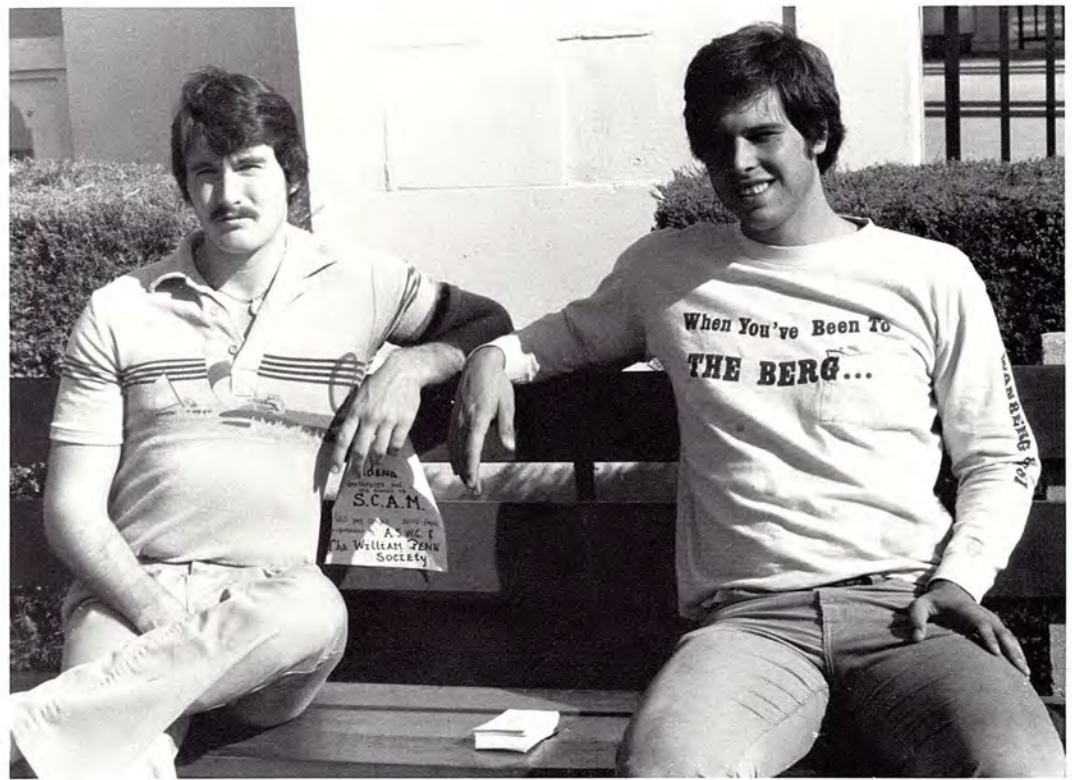
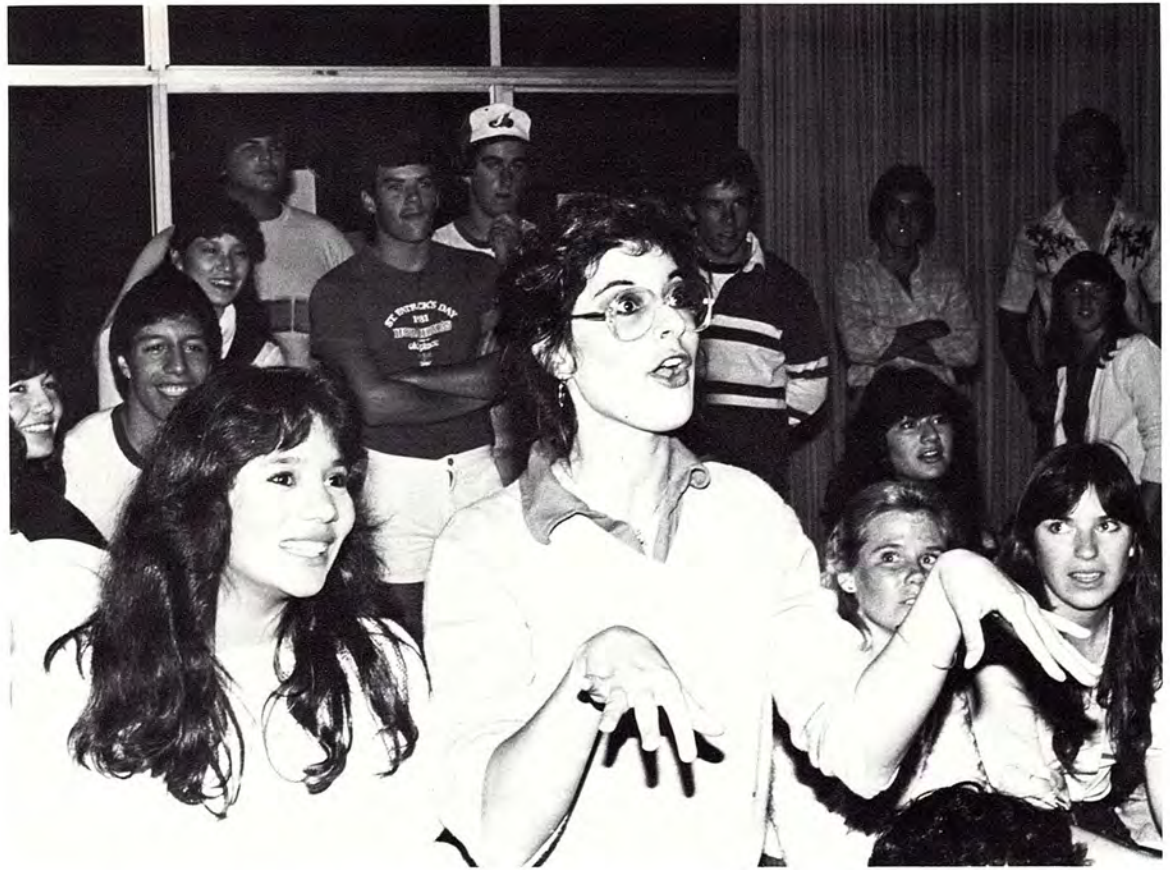




FESTIVAL OF LIGHTS '81

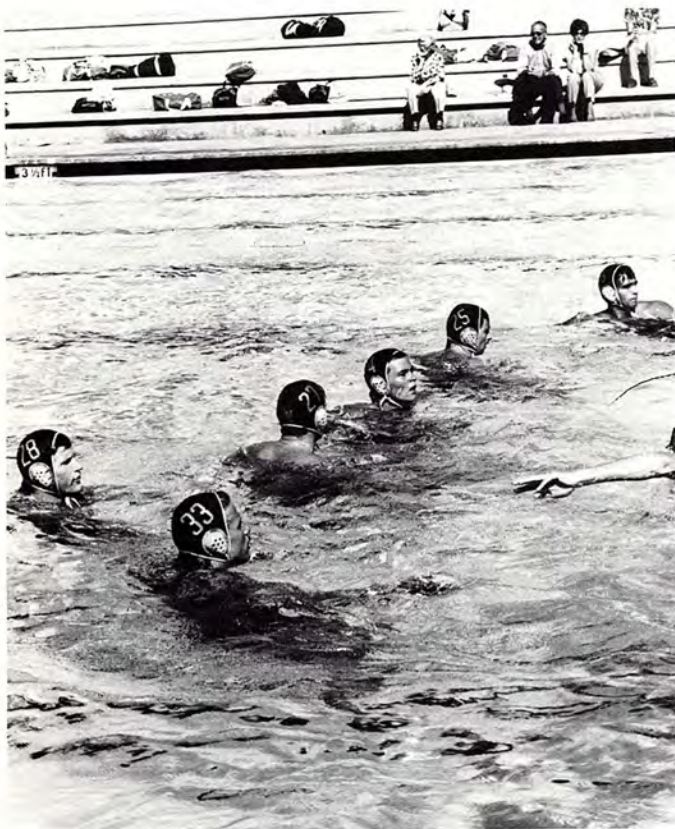
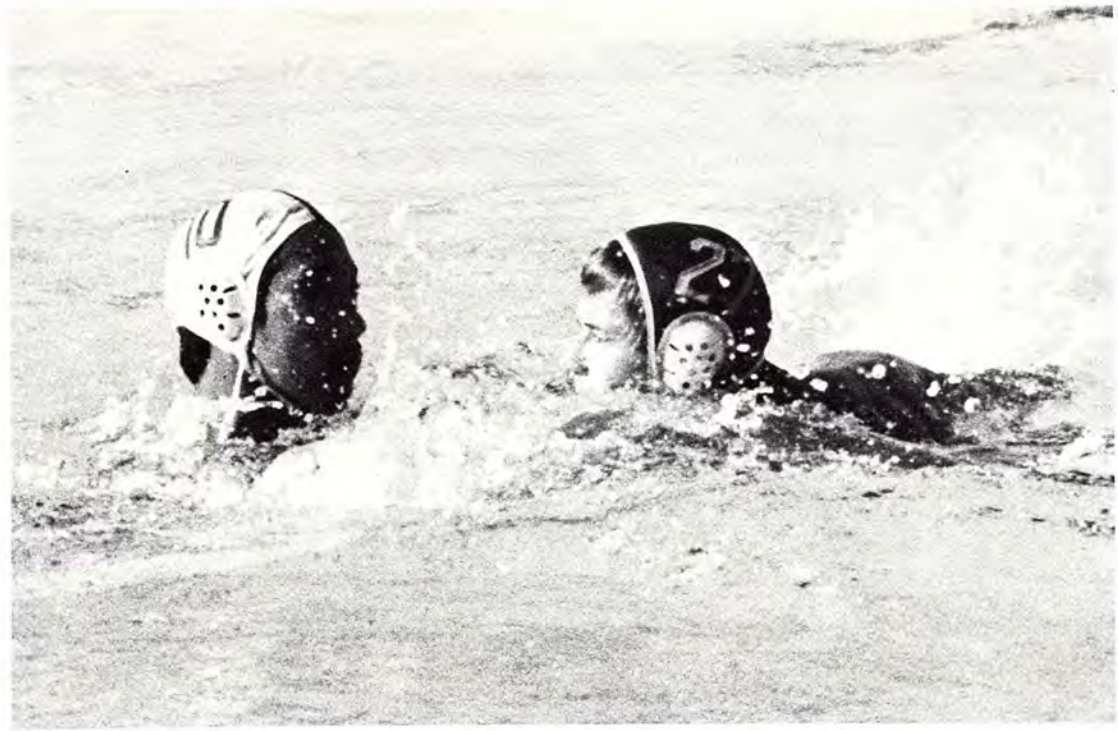


SOCCER

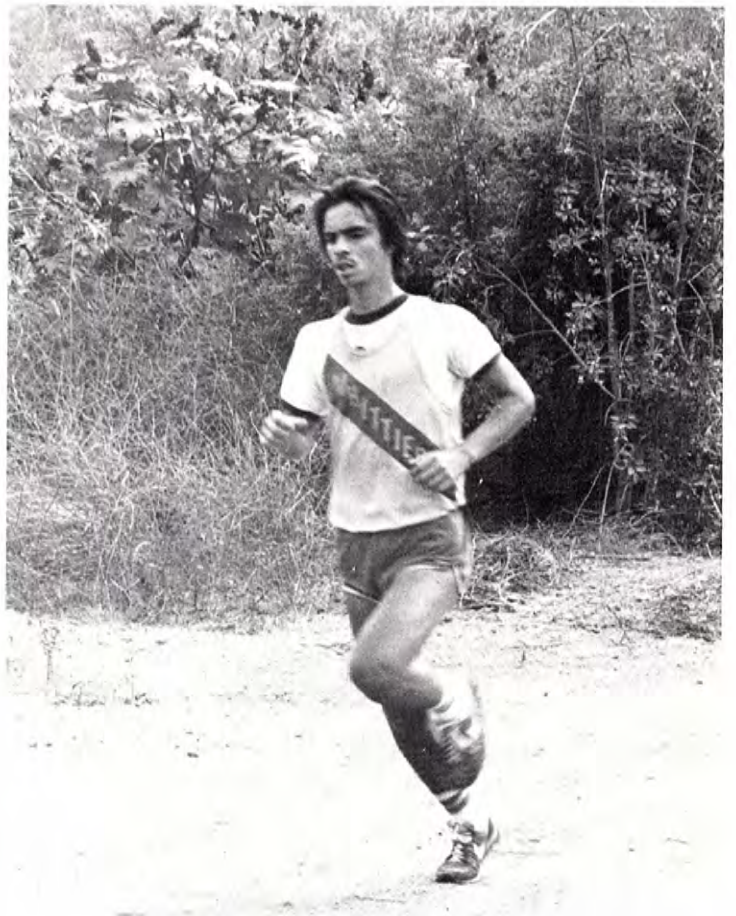
Coach Phil O'Brien is looking for a stronger team next year when Freshman Gary Walker will place among the pack, having overcome a leg injury this past summer.

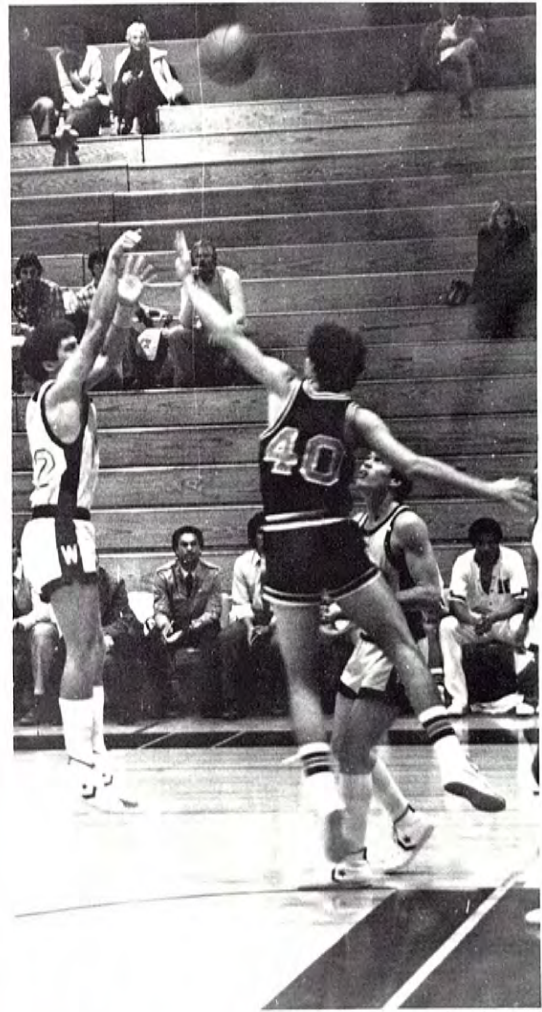
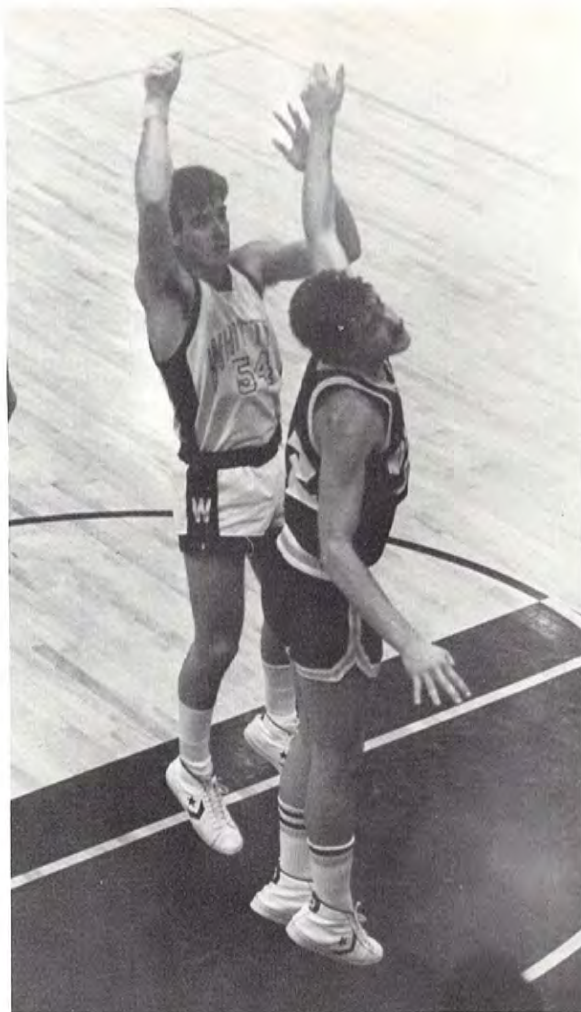
WOMENS CROSS- COUNTRY

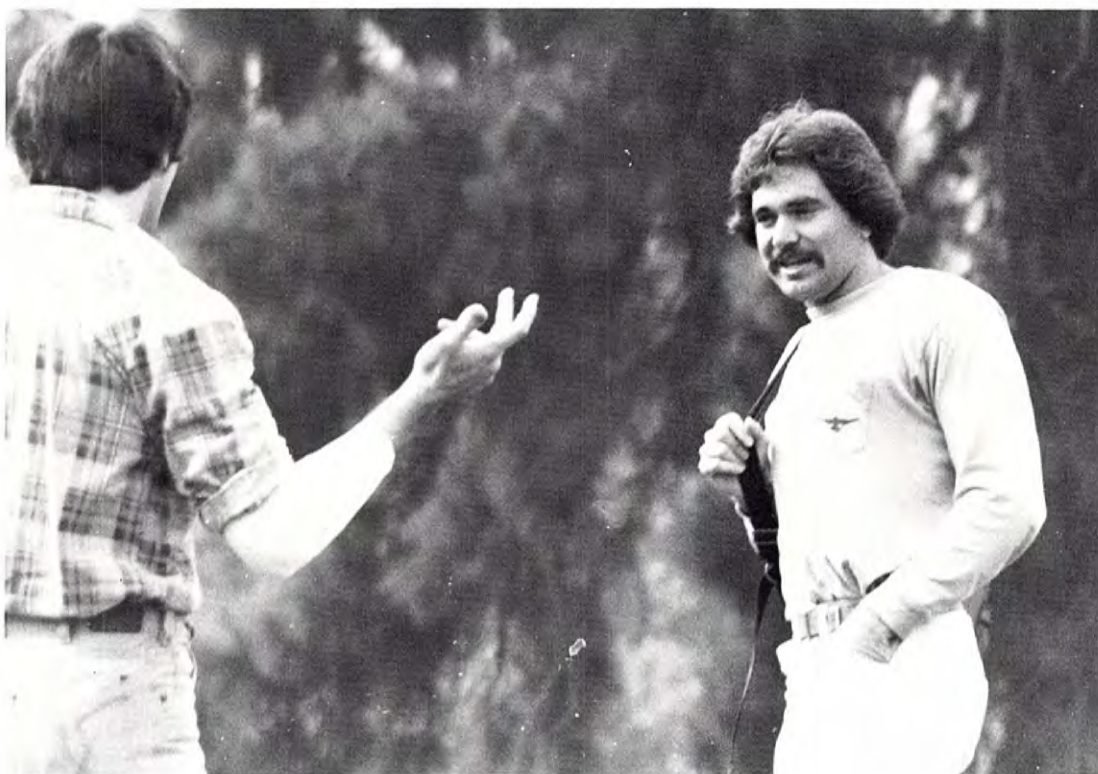
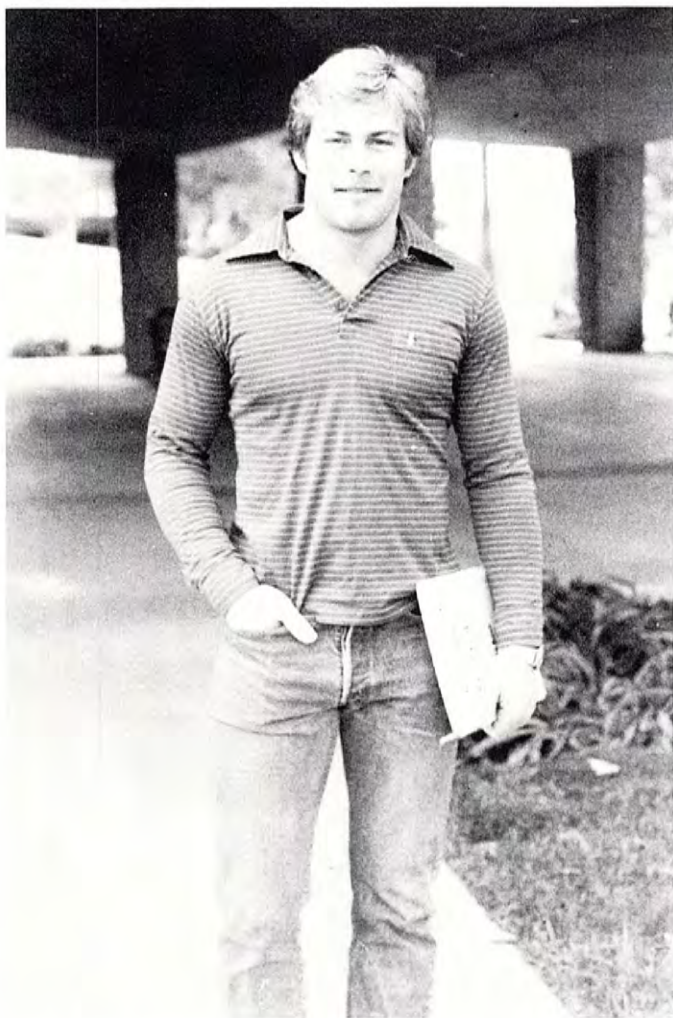


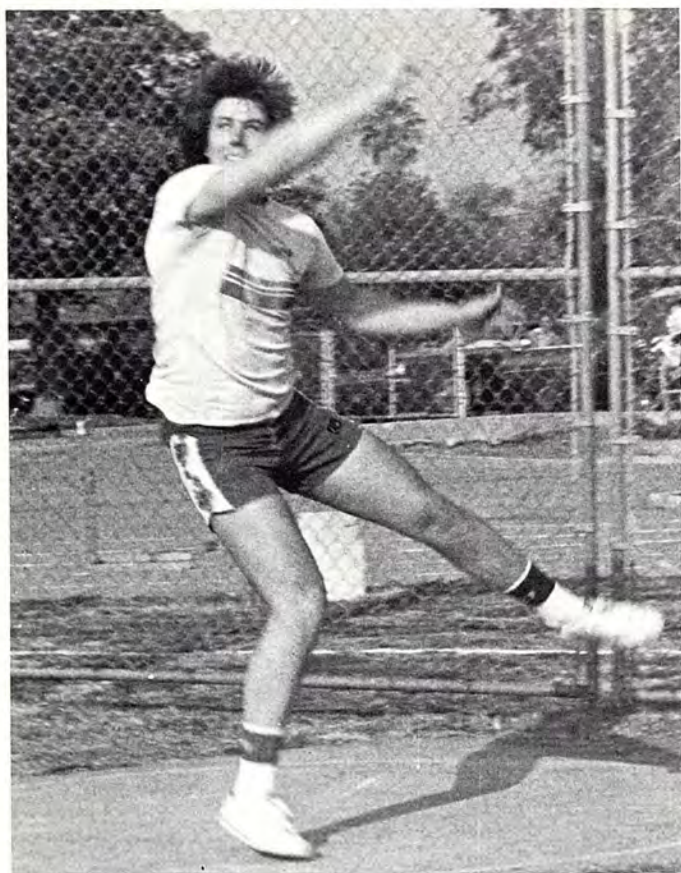
BASEBALL

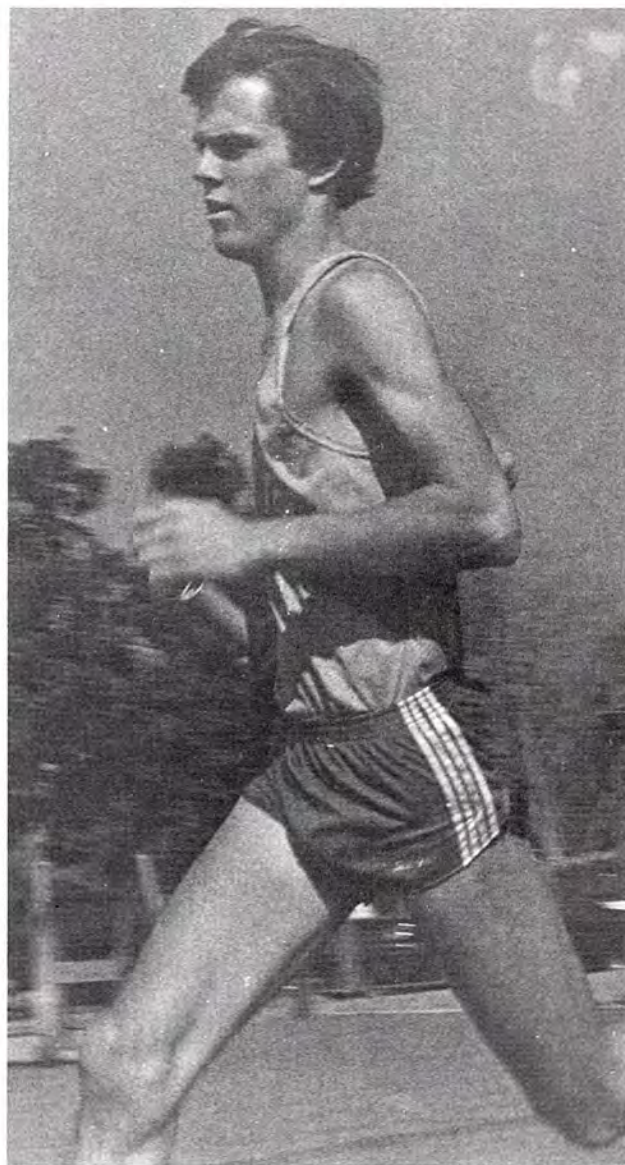




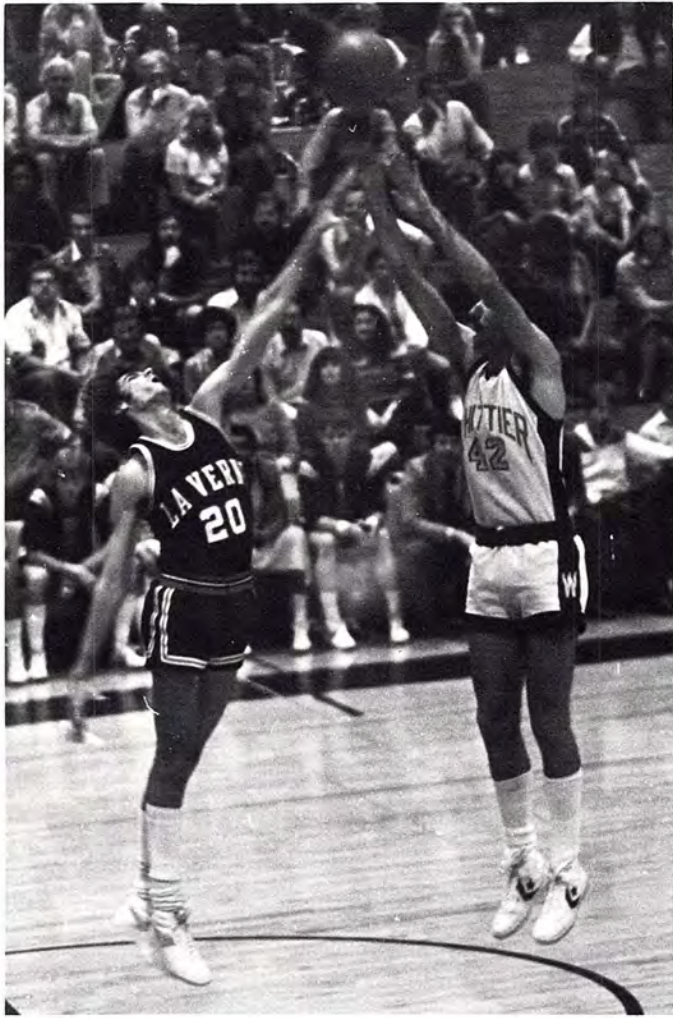


TRACK AND FIELD

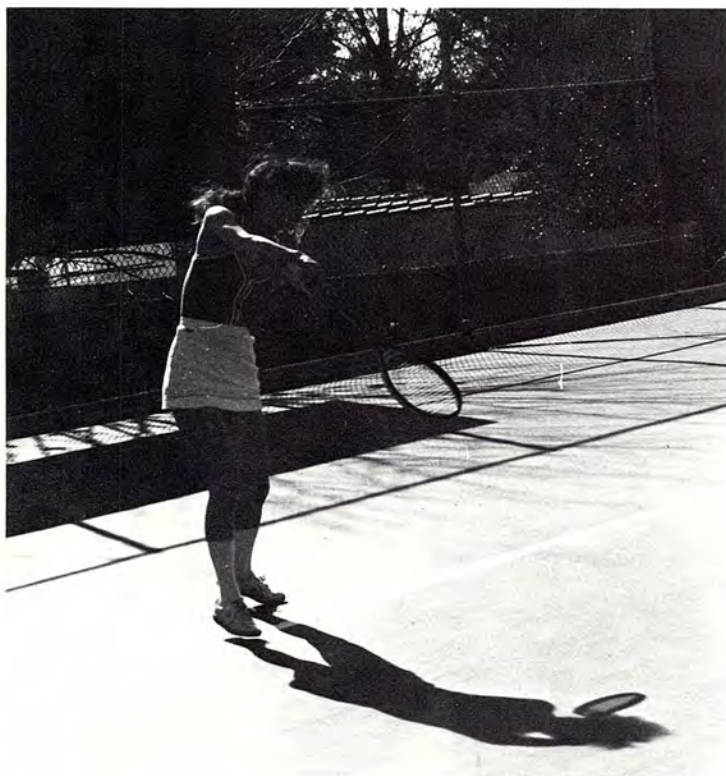








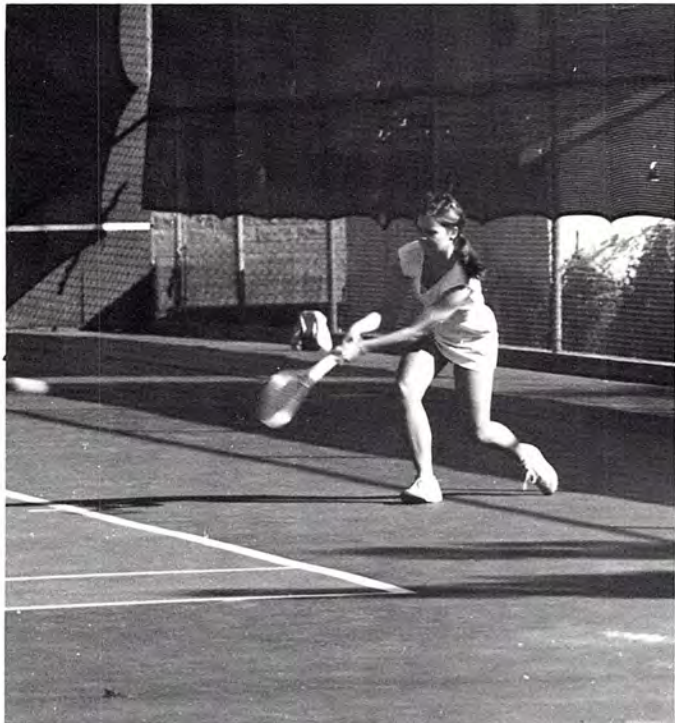






WOMEN'S TENNIS

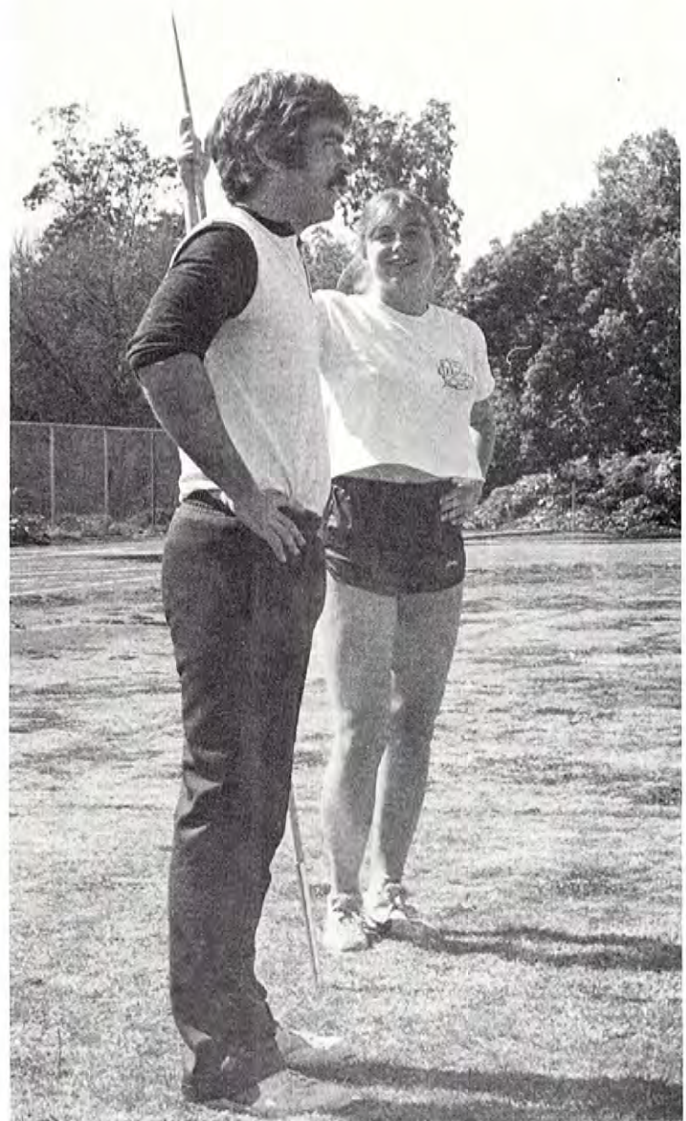


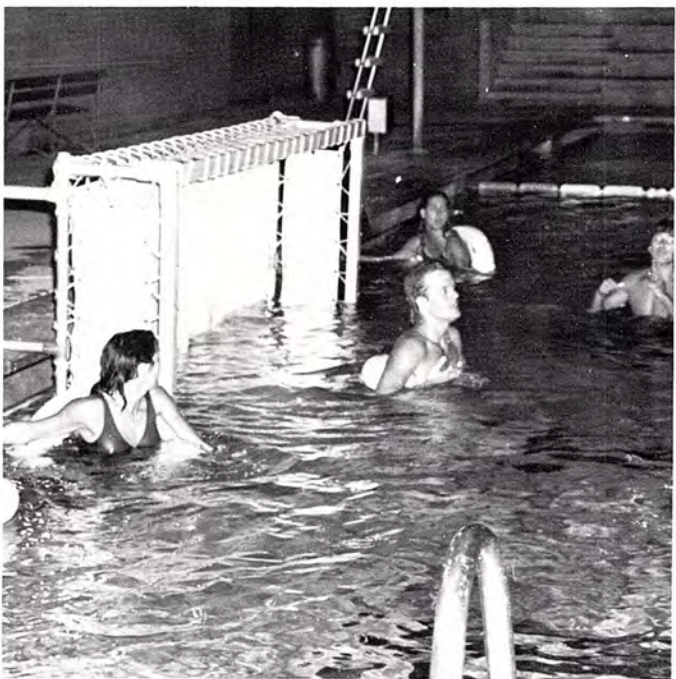
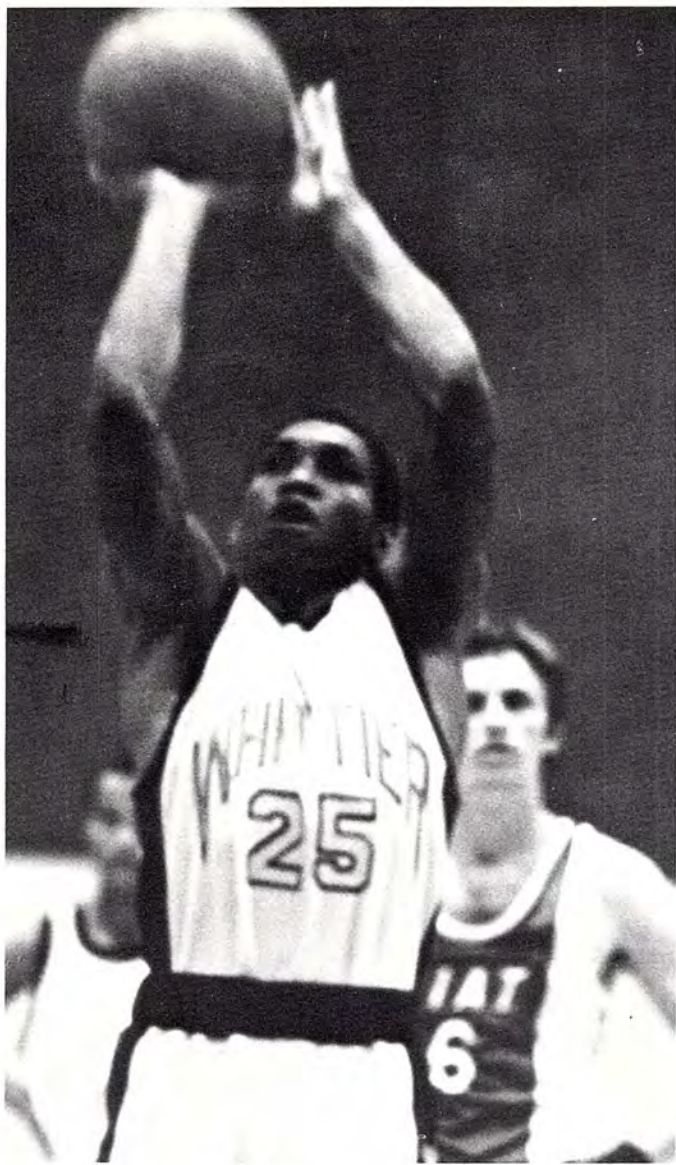


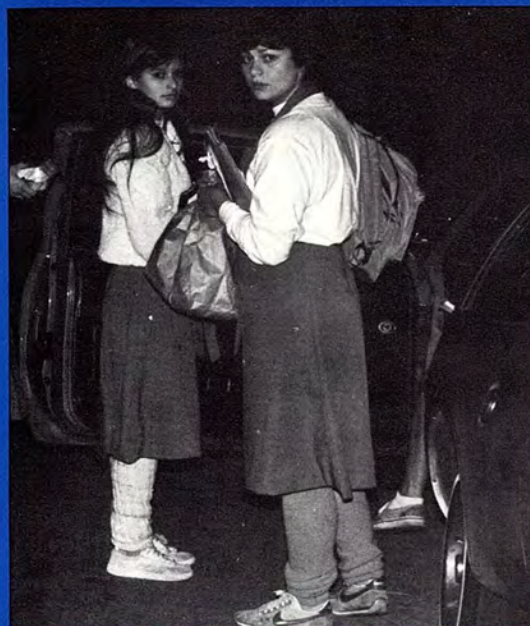
LACROSSE

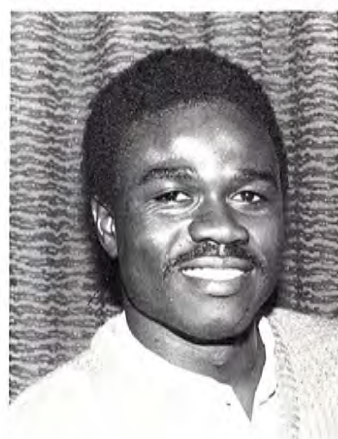

INTERNATIONAL STUDENT UNION

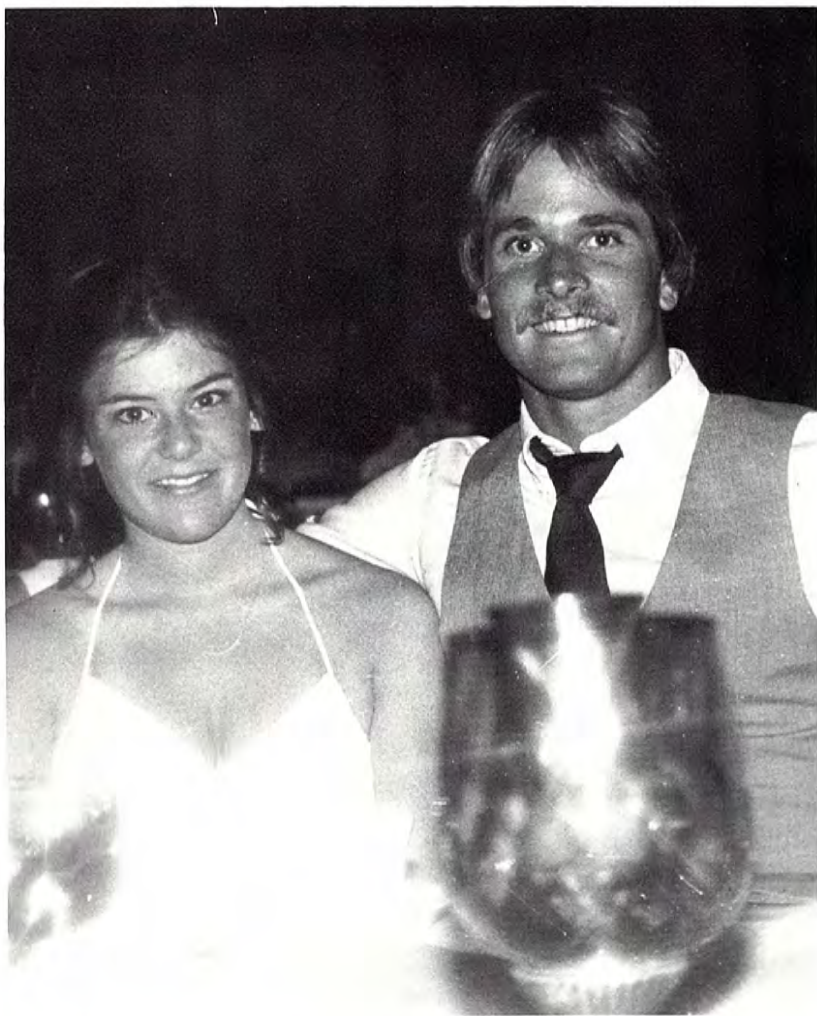

Dear Friends:


