July 16, 1972 Stayton Island, Oregon

DORN: This is an interview with Mrs. Shirley Nixon

Christensen, primarily for the purpose of locating

family photographs. The date is July 16, 1972, at Stayton Island, Oregon. Mrs. Christensen, will you please tell me

where and when you were born?

CHRISTENSEN: January 18, 1920, near Neola, Greenbrier County,

West Virginia.

DORN: When did you come to Oregon?

CHRISTENSEN: 1931.

DORN: And did you come with your parents?

CHRISTENSEN: Yes, we all come out together.

DORN: Did you get your education in Oregon?

CHRISTENSEN: Yes, I did.

DORN: Where did you go to school here?

CHRISTENSEN: Well, we all went to Bridge Public School in Coos

County, Oregon.

DORN: What were the names of your parents?

CHRISTENSEN: Henry D. Nixon and Lula Tinnie Thacker Nixon.

DORN: And how about your grandparents?

CHRISTENSEN: Boston A. Nixon and Lucy Nixon.

DORN: Have you ever met the President?

CHRISTENSEN: No, I have not met him personally, but I keep up

with him.

DORN: How about his parents, had you ever met Hannah and

[Francis Anthony] Frank Nixon?

CHRISTENSEN: No, I never did meet them. Didn't have the oppor-

tunity really.

DORN: Do you have any idea about any family pictures or

documents of any kind that might be around?

CHRISTENSEN: Yes, I had some pictures taken. I took them myself.

I'm going to see if I can get it. I loaned it to my father and I asked for it back. I'm going to

get it and see if I can get some made of it. It's very good. It's of Grandpa [Boston] Nixon and Grandma [Lucy], sitting in their little cabin on either side of the doorway, and it's a very good picture of both of them.

DORN: That's Boston Nixon. Well, we certainly would like

to have a copy if it's at all possible for the Nixon

Library. Was any other member of your family in-

terested in seeking public office at all?

CHRISTENSEN: Not really, but we keep up with it.

DORN: Do you know of anybody that might have inspired

Richard Nixon to attain the high position that he

has in the world, probably the most powerful man in the world? Have you ever heard of anybody that particularly inspired

him?

CHRISTENSEN: No, not really, of course I wasn't. . . . Unless it

would be my aunt, and she knew him very well.

DORN: What was her name?

CHRISTENSEN: Her name was Margaret Martin.

DORN: Where did she live?

CHRISTENSEN: She lived at 10 West Clark Street, Eureka, California.

DORN: Did he visit her, do you know?

CHRISTENSEN: Yes. He and Pat [Patricia Ryan Nixon] came to visit

one time there in Eureka, but I wasn't living there at the time. But my aunt told me about the visit

they had.

DORN: Did she mention anything about Pat Nixon, the wife

of a young man in politics, as the wife of a young

lawyer?

CHRISTENSEN: Oh, yes, she was very proud of him being a lawyer

and she followed everything that he'd done and had

all the documents she could get on him and all the

pictures and all that sort of thing. I talked to her lots about

it.

DORN: Now, you live in Eureka, right?

CHRISTENSEN: Yes.

DORN: And you came up here for this reunion particularly.

CHRISTENSEN: Yes, I did.

DORN: How did you come, did you drive?

CHRISTENSEN: Yes. I come with my Uncle Kessler Nixon and helped

him drive.

DORN: You came for this specific reason, for this reunion?

CHRISTENSEN: Yes.

DORN: It certainly must be inspiring to get among so many

of your relatives and get reacquainted or acquainted.

CHRISTENSEN: It really is, because they all grew up and you'd learn

about all of them, and each one of us, of course, we're always following Richard [Milhous Nixon]. It's

just nice to get together again.

DORN: Do you have any idea how many different branches of

the family are represented here today?

CHRISTENSEN: Different branches?

DORN: I mean somebody's son or somebody's daughter and

their children?

CHRISTENSEN: My goodness, we ought to count them, I know it could

be done.

DORN: I noticed there was a guest book in there.

CHRISTENSEN: Yes, there's a guest book.

I would like to have a copy of that or write the DORN:

names down just for history.

We'll see that you get one of those. CHRISTENSEN:

Will you see what you can do about the pictures that DORN:

you spoke about, and would you contact me about those?

We'd like very much to gather in as many documents and pictures as we can for the Nixon Library.

CHRISTENSEN: I'll see what I can do about that.

Is there anything else that you can think of that DORN:

you'd like to mention?

Not that I can think of right now, but that we are CHRISTENSEN:

very proud of Richard.
